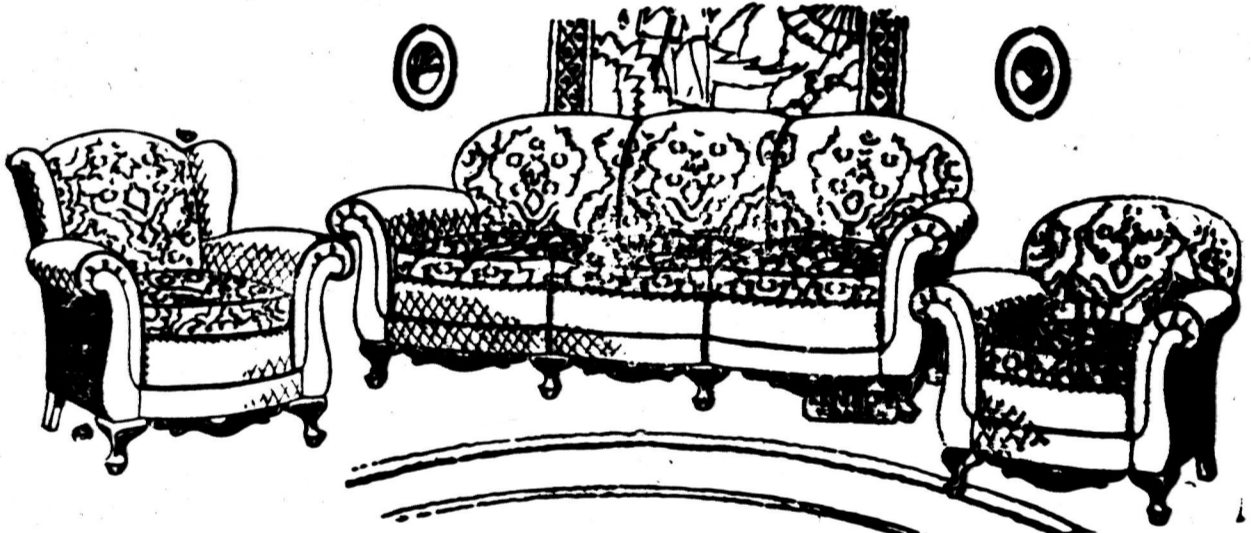
Tenders will not be considered unless made on Printed forms supplied by the Department and in accordance with conditions contained therein.
