Twenty Years Ago

From The Record's Files for the Year 1911

Wednesday, September 6th, 1911

The Women's Institute will meet at Mrs. Garbat Steele on Thursday afternoon, September 14th at 3 p.m. All members are requested to be present.

During a severe electrical storm which passed over this section of the country on Friday afternoon at 2:30 p.m., the large frame barn belonging to Robert Taylor, about two miles south east of the village, was struck by lightning and burned to the ground, together with the season's crop. Two horses, valued at \$500, 1 pig and some poultry also perished in the flames. A small barn was saved. This will be a decided loss as well as a great inconvenience to Mr. Taylor, especially coming as it does at this time of year. The loss is only partly covered by insurance, there being \$1200 on barn and contents. The sympathy of the entire community will be extended to Mr. Taylor in the loss which he has sustained.

Card of Thanks:—Mr. and Mrs. Robert Taylor wish through the columns of the Record to express their thanks to the friends and neighbors who worked so heroically during the fire which destroyed their barn on Friday last. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lemon and the former's father, John Lemon of St. Thomas, and Mrs. Thomas Porter of Embro, motored through town Sunday on their way to visit Mrs. John Lemon's daughter, Mrs. (Rev.) Wright at Smithville. A runaway which might have ended with more serious results happened on Sunday evening. It appears that Gordon McKewen and John Mitchell were driving along the road and when in front of Thos. Harris Butcher shop a dog ran out and frightened the animal which took fright and ran away. The young men jumped and it was lucky they did, for the horse, continuing on its mad race, ran against a post taking a wheel from the buggy and otherwise damaging it. The horse did not cease its gallop until it reached the barn-yard of J. J. Parsons and was little the worse after its 2:40 trot. The horse belonged to young McKewen, who is engaged as cheesemaker with J. J. Parsons. What might have terminated in a serious conflagration on Friday afternoon ended with only a slight damage. when the barn caught fire from a spark from the engine. Luckily there were plenty of ladders, pails and water hence the fire was soon distinguished. A large straw stack was threatened with destruction but by the persistent efforts of the threshers the fire was kept under control and soon extinguished. The only damage done was a small hole burned in the roof of the barn. Mr. Fox feels indeed thankful that his loss is no greater, for had the fire gained the least headway everything would have been levelled to the ground. The loss is fully covered by insurance.

A sad accident occurred on Thursday last in which Leslie Marr of Marburg was the victim. He had driven to J. C. Sanderson's for some posts and when leaving his horse took fright at a passing automobile and he was thrown from his seat unto the hard ground, sustaining a fracture to his left arm near the elbow. He at once drove to the office of Dr. Newell where the injured member was attended to. He is, at time of writing, getting along as well as can be expected.
