## OBITUARY

MARY ISABEL FLETCHER

In the death of the late Mary Isabel Fletcher, relict of the late John Bailey, who after a long and lingering illness passed away on Thursday, September 4th, 1930, in her 86 year, Walpole has lost one of its oldest and most highly respected residents. She was born at Nanticoke, on December 14, 1844, and was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hiel Fletcher. On May 25th, 1868, she was married to John Bailey, a native of Belfast, Ireland, by Rev. Wm. Craigie of Knox Presbyterian Church at Port Dover. After their marriage they settled on a farm on Mud Street in the northern part of Walpole, and lived there until age and ill-health compelled them to retire from farm life after which they moved, with their son, Mr. William Bailey to their new home in Jarvis, in May, 1915. Her husband predeceased her on May 23rd, 1921, and since his death she has spent part time at the homes of her daughter, Mrs. W. G. Stewart, Hagersville, and at her son's, Wm. J. Bailey, Jarvis. During her life she was a faithful member of the Methodist (now United) Church.

She leaves to mourn her loss, one daughter, Mrs. W. G. Stewart, of Hagersville, and three sons, Arnott, Hagersville, William J., Jarvis, and Bridgeman V., of Waterford, also ten grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held from the home of her son, Wm. J. Bailey, at 2:30 p. m. on Sunday, Sept. 7th to the United Church, and thence to Springvale Cemetery for interment. Rev. P. E. Deeth had charge of the service and was assisted by Rev. G. K. Bradshaw, of Simcoe, (a nephew of the deceased) During the service Mr. Charlie Davidson sang a very appropriate solo, "There is a Land." Rev. M. J. Aiken of Hagersville assisted at the grave.

The pall bearers were six grand-nephews, Messrs. Walter, Orland and Melvin Fletcher, Herbert Watson and Reto McKeen. Relatives attended the funeral from Wellsdale, Alta., Toronto, Hamilton, Brantford, Norwich, Waterford, Port Dover, Pt. Ryerse, Simcoe, Welland, Hagersville, Tillsonburg, Lynedoch, Langton and Springvale.

The Late Stephen Allen.

Death has come again and taken away one of our citizens who has had the honor the past few years of being the oldest person in the village and one who was very highly respected and honored by every body in this vicinity. In the person of the late Mr. Stephen Allen who passed away at his late home in the village of Jarvis on August 19th, 1930, in his 92nd year. The late Mr. Allen was born on the homestead farm three miles east of Jarvis on March 17th, 1839, where he lived until 1917 when he moved to the village of Jarvis. He was the eldest of a family of eleven, six sons and five daughters, his parents were Mr. David Allen and Agnes Gilliland, who came from Ireland when quite young and at the time of their marriage settled on this same farm which is still owned by the Allen family. They started in hard to clear up a home for themselves and the family, but death came and took the father when the family was still quite young, leaving Stephen, the eldest, to take his father's place in helping the mother to provide for and raise a family and all were spared to live to the age of manhood and womanhood. Stephen and his brother Bryce continued farm life, while the four younger boys each

learned a trade, the five girls also did their part in home making and all settled in homes of their own in this vicinity. The late Mr. Allen was of a quiet and retiring nature. He had no desire for public life but was always anxious and ready to help along any good cause and was considered a true friend and a good neighbor to everyone. In politics he was a staunch Conservative and in religion a Presbyterian. His wife, who was Elizabeth Patterson, predeceased him four years ago. He leaves to mourn his loss, one son, David Coyne, also one brother and two sisters, David M. and Miss Mary Allen of Jarvis and Mrs. Joseph Wyckoff of Simcoe.

The funeral was held from his late residence in Jarvis at 2:30 p.m., August 21st with the service at the house and interment in Knox Church Cemetery and was very largely attended.

The service was in charge of Rev. P. E. Deeth of Wesley United Church Jarvis, who preached a very appropriate sermon, taking for his text, "Well done, Good and faithful servant."

## Offer Big Prize To British Glider

A prize of one thousand pounds has been offered by the British Gliding Association to the first British pilot accomplishing an engineless flight across the British channel in a glider of all British construction. The contest is open for two years, from June 1, 1930 to May 31, 1932.

The pilot must hold a current British "C" glider pilot's license, the launching must be a normal haul launch with not more than two persons upon one tow rope, and the start must be made during the hours of daylight. The entry fee is five pounds and at least 14 days' notice must be given of any proposed attempt.
