Acid Soil in Haldimand Receive Attention, Junior's Plan County-wide Survey

In co-operation with the Ontario Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, and the Department of Chemistry, G.A.C. Gaulth, a county-wide survey of the soils for acidity is being planned by the Juniors of the County. Arrangements have been completed whereby testing equipment will be supplied free of charge to any boy or Junior Farmer who will make a report on the test of one field on each of four farms in his community. Every Junior Farmer should submit his name and receive complete instructions together with the test equipment.

In order to have some uniformity in the results, test will be made on the following basis:—

1. Samples to be taken from top six inches of soil.

2. Samples to be taken from a field which is being seeded down in 1931.

3. Samples are to come from fields where lime has not been applied at least ten rods from the road.

Farm Girls' Trip to Royal Winter Fair, Nov. 24-28

Those who will be entitled to participate in the educational trip to Toronto during the time of the Royal Winter Fair will be competitors in a County Household Judging Competition to be held at Caledonia on Saturday, October 11th, 1930, and must be between sixteen and twenty-six years of age, inclusive, on November 1st, 1930. The selections will be based upon the standing taken in the County Competitions.

Only those who are living on a farm will be eligible for the trip. Those qualified as school teachers or those who have graduated from, or are attending a Normal School, a Domestic Science School, or University are not eligible. Married persons will not be eligible.

The trip is provided to give opportunities and privileges to farm girls who have not had advantages of special training in Domestic Science Schools, Normal Schools or Universities.

An opportunity will be provided to visit all sections of the Royal Winter Fair and to witness interesting portions of ring programs. In addition, visits will be made to educational institutions, manufacturing plants and retail centres which will be of particular interest and educational value to rural girls. It is hoped that the trip will establish on the part of the girls a better understanding of the city and its methods of production and distribution. It is hoped that the girls will be able to derive information from the trip which will enable them to add to improved methods of marketing.

The Ontario Department of Agriculture undertakes to provide the following free of charge:

Railway fare from home station to Toronto.

Lodging accommodation for four nights.

Meals while in Toronto.

Sleeper and meals on train for those from a distance of two hundred miles or more.

A program, with free transportation and entertainment, to include a sight-seeing trip through the city and visits to manufacturing plants, wholesale and retail centres, educational institutions, as well as visits to Royal Winter Fair.

While the selection of members of the party must this year be based upon the standing taken in County Judging Competitions, plans are under consideration for requiring those participating another year to have carried on successfully some project of special value to farm girls.

The members of the Women's Institute Provincial Board from the outlying sections of the province will accompany parties on trip to Toronto.

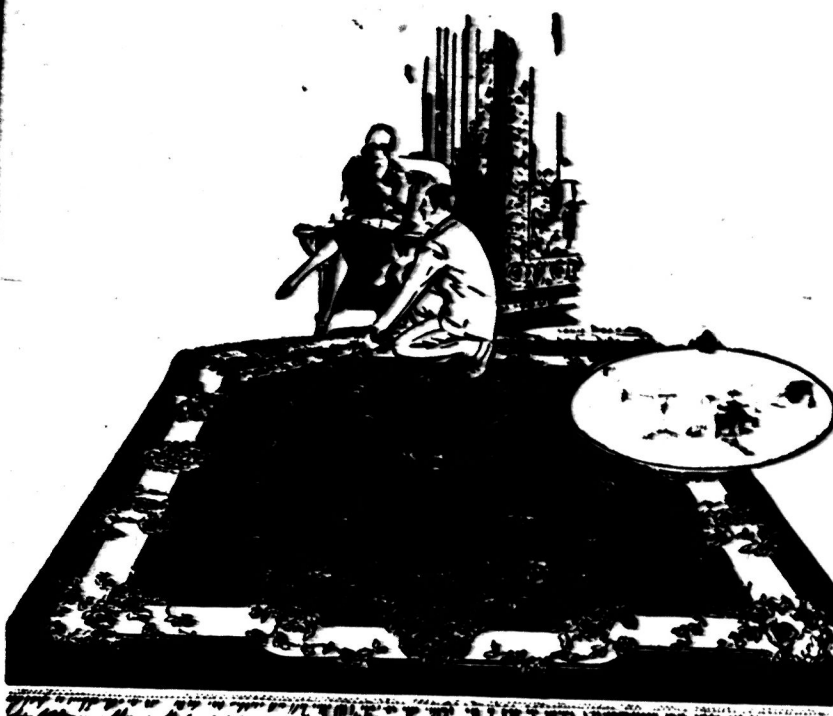

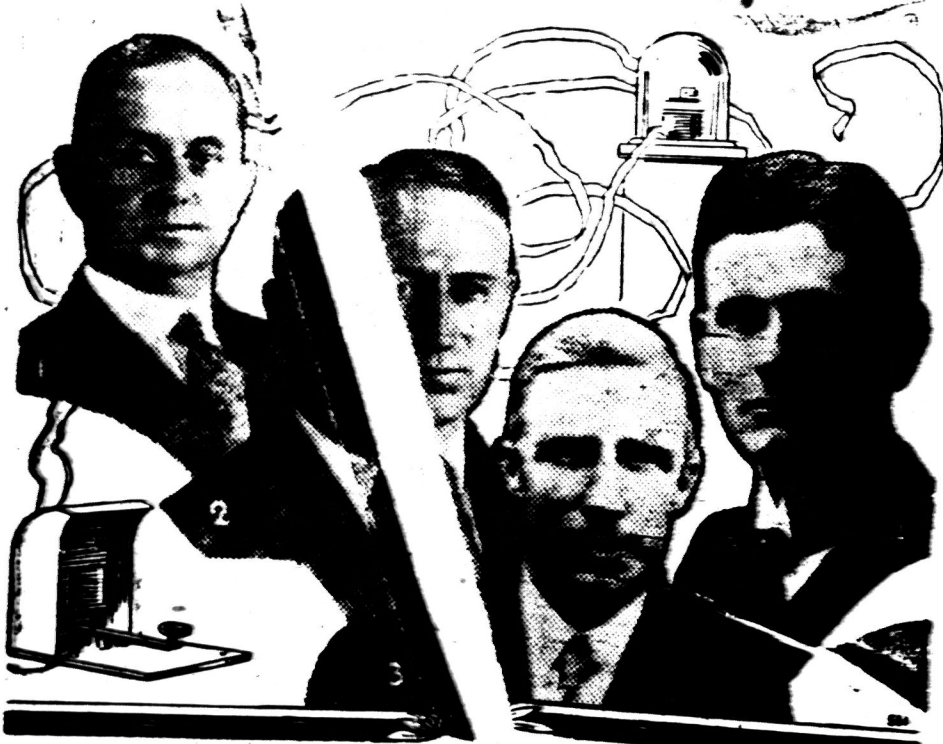
