Good Roads Committee Report

To the Warden and Members of the County Council, Gentlemen, we, your Good Roads Committee, beg leave to report as follows:—
We have examined the pay lists and accounts submitted by the Superintendent and recommend them for payment.
The roads under construction are progressing as follows:
Road 12—South Cayuga and Dunn, will be completed about Oct. 10.
Road 12—Walpole, Oneida, North Cayuga, and Rainham, will be completed about Oct. 20th.
Road 13—Moulton, will be completed about Nov. 1st.
Road 17—North Cayuga and Canboro, with connecting link in Village of Cayuga, is completed excepting a couple of miles in North Cayuga, which will require more screenings where the stone is not all covered.
Road 11—Dunn, will be surface treated as soon as surface is prepared.
Roads that require resurfacing will be attended to during the month of October.

A by-law authorizing the issue of debentures for \$55,000.00 bearing interest at 5 per cent per annum for the improvement of Highways, dated Oct. 20th, 1930, and to be repayable in ten equal amounts of \$7,127.22 was read a first, second and third time and carried.

Finance Committee Report

The Finance Committee recommended that accounts amounting to \$15,220 be paid.

Children's Aid Society showed expenses for the month of August amounting to \$368.98.

Two wards were returned and replaced. Four children made temporary wards, the Culp family, Oneida Township. All wards were visited during the month and found satisfactory.

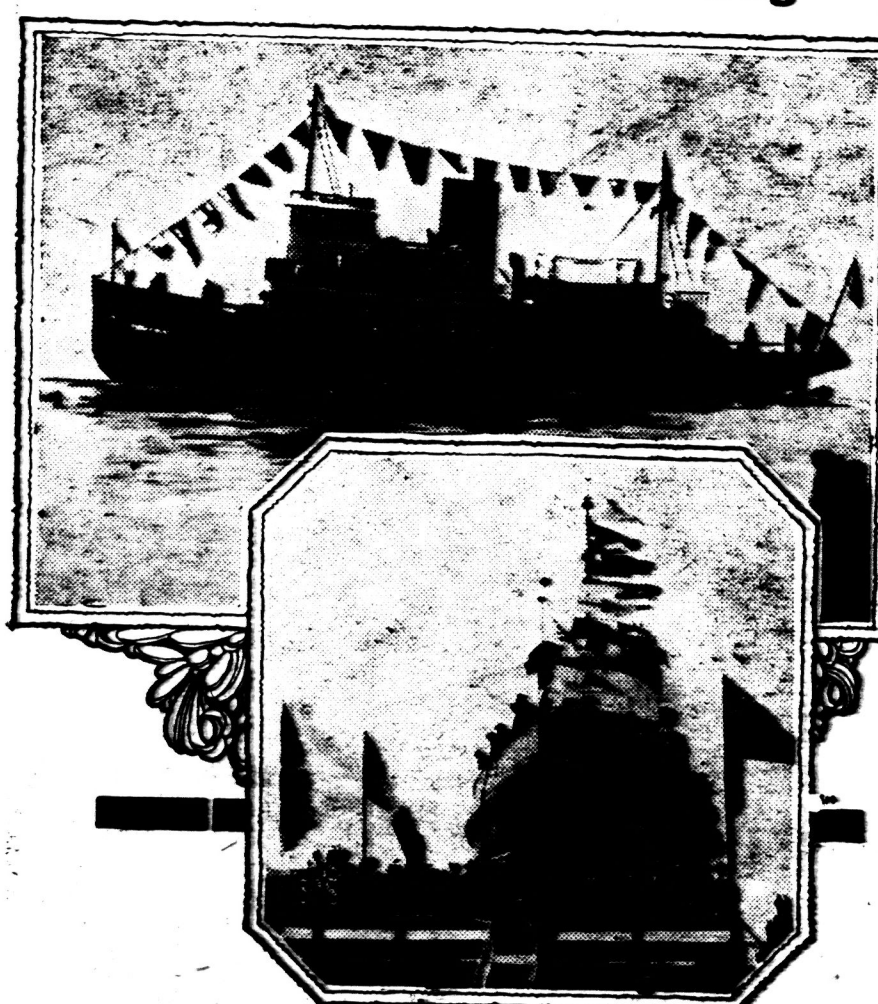
ANYTHING WRONG WITH ME
If they were to be asked the question, the majority of the people would reply, "There is nothing wrong with me." Yet we know that although this answer would be an honest expression of opinion, it would, in many cases, be far from the truth. By this, we mean that many people have something wrong with them without their knowing it, and that trouble often takes possession without announcing its arrival.
Admittedly we should all be able to say "There is nothing wrong with me," but we should be able to say it with an assurance of its being true. It may be true, but we do not know whether it is or not unless we have had a health examination.
Why is it when it is common knowledge that all machines require supervision and regular checking up to keep them running smoothly and to prolong their usefulness, there is utter disregard of the need for any such supervision of the body machines.
It is surprising how many successful business men seem to imagine that, because they have accumulated wealth, their bodies are in some way different, and who act as if they were in some way immune to the ills that befall.
It would seem that as health is such an evident asset, it would not be necessary to point out to any person the fact that it is. It might be expected that the man who is successful in business would make at least a fair success of living, and yet we know that this is not the case with many men and women.
We are not suggesting that the right way to live is to cultivate a state of mind that considers nothing but possibilities of illness; that would indeed be anything but desirable. We do state emphatically, however, that the art of healthy living is the most important business responsibility we have.
Based on this understanding, we recommend that the periodic health examination is a simple and desirable routine which should be practised by everyone. Periodic health examination is a good habit; it is good business. Ignorance is always expensive, if not dangerous. Ignorance as to the condition of your body simply leads you to cheat yourself by depriving yourself of the care you may need.
The enemies of health can usually be overcome. Disease when treated early can be cured. The best way to accomplish this is by the periodic health examination.

Canada's First Electric Tug



The first electrically-driven tug to be built in Canada was launched at Hanson, Que., recently, when the "Proscott" Diesel-electric tug for the Canadian Pacific Car and Passenger Transfer Company's service between Prescott, Ont., and Ogdensburg, N.Y., slipped gracefully into the waters of the St. Lawrence after the traditional bottle of champagne had been broken across her bows by Mrs. Duff, wife of Mr. McDuff, manager of the Canadian Pacific Great Lakes Steamship Service. As a pioneer feature in Canadian shipping, the Diesel-electric engine with which the new vessel is equipped, are of special interest to marine engineers. Each of 500 H.P., they are directly connected to twin generators capable of delivering 320 kilowatts, each at 250 volts, when operated at 245 revolutions per minute.
In operation, a car barge with three tracks for 16 hundred-ton cars, will be lashed to the starboard counter of the tug which it will be possible to control either from its own wheel-house or from the bridge of the car barge.
