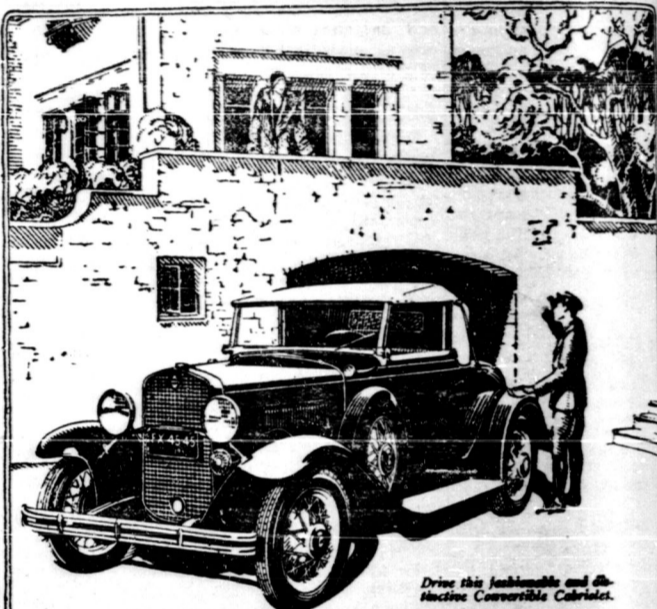
#### HAGERSVILLE
