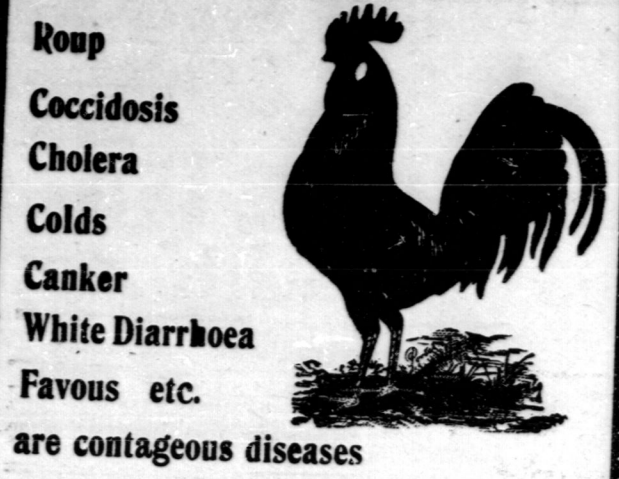

UNREASONABLE FEARS CAUSE MUCH MISERY

Ignorant or Thoughtless Parents Often Responsible For Children Becoming Unduly Fearful

Among the patients regularly found in every mental hospital are those obsessed with fears. That most of these fears are quite unreasonable is evident to everyone except their victims, but to them they are very real. Such cases, however, are extreme. But the difference between these patients and ourselves is only a matter of degree. Talking to the mental hospital patient we can easily see that his fears are largely imaginary. But we are often unwilling to see that our lesser fears are for the most part quite unjustified.

Fear, of course, can be constructive, such as the fear of starvation, which results in industry; the fear of ignorance, which leads to study. Even these are likely to be overcome, however, like the fear of want which leads to miserliness and hoarding.

While fear has a very decided action upon the human body, it is probable that the effects of fears caused by exaggerated situations such as those mentioned above are not as serious as those due to specific sources.

The world is full of people who are always worrying about something. They worry about their health, they fear the loss of their job or their money, they are unable to sleep at night, they are unable to do their work, they are unable to enjoy life, they are unable to be happy. They are unable to be happy because of some act they have committed.

Newest Locomotive is Monster Indeed

The largest and most powerful locomotive of its kind in the world has just been completed in the shops of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Montreal. It is a new era in the advancement of steam motive power of greater efficiency and higher sustained capacity. It is called a "multi-pressure" engine because it generates its steam in three separate portions and at three different pressures and, because of its radical departure in boiler design, is creating something of a future in mechanical and railroad circles.

Facts and figures of the "8000" will give some indication of its magnitude. It is only 21 feet 6 inches long, 10 feet 6 inches high, and weighs 300,000 lbs., and of 765,000 lbs., or 392 1/2 tons. It has five driving wheels on each side, each of which is 63 inches in diameter. Its tractive effort is 90,000 lbs., which means that on a level track it will haul a freight train, over a mile in length, made up of one hundred and fifty 40-ton cars, and representing a total weight of 6000 tons. Its tender has a capacity of 12,000 gallons of water and 4350 gallons of fuel oil enabling it to travel long hauls without replenishing. There are 18,000 feet or slightly over three and a half miles of seamless steel tubes used in the construction of the boiler units alone.

"ONE-LINGER" WAS CHEAPER THAN HORSE AND RIG

"Can I Afford an Automobile?" was the title of an interesting magazine article written 25 years ago, which has recently come to light, and the author, taking the single-cylinder Oldsmobile on which to base his argument, figured it out that way.

"Cost of horse and vehicle, \$450; cost of keeping, \$484. Cost of motor car, \$650; cost of maintaining, \$341. This gives an excess of \$2.00 in the first cost of the automobile and a saving of \$88 in the cost of maintenance. Both estimates have been made exclusive of interest on the investment, depreciation, or the outlay for the extraordinary repairs or doctoring. On the whole, this seems to favor a decision on the side of the motor car." That first Oldsmobile was rated at five horsepower and had "a sustained speed of 25 miles an hour, weighing 750 pounds and costing less than a pound!"

The writer adds: "Generally this includes needed accessories. No whip is needed but a towline may be. All extras had for \$25, making \$775 the total cost of the outfit!"

If a little thin as grading is necessary when selling to U.S.A. before they can be registered in American Associations, also no cows wrong in the order can be shipped out of Buffalo. They are thoroughly examined by two veterinaries at the border and must be sound. If not they are slaughtered and meat value given or returned to the herd they came from.
