

We are quite satisfied with the showing of the British teams at the Empire Games just concluded at Hamilton, Ont., for we picked up quite a lot of honors, and if I may say so, made a very creditable showing. It was the statement of R. T. Britten, in charge of the swimmers who hung up several new marks at the meeting. He thought the Games would be of incalculable value to the Empire as a whole, since they brought all parts of it together at one time and one place.

The maiden voyage of the new Canadian Pacific steamer of the Empress of Japan, which sailed from Yokohama to Victoria, was completed in eight days, six hours and 28 minutes, beating the Empress of Canada record for the run, established in 1918, by four hours and thirty minutes. E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the railway company, wired congratulations to Captain E. Altman, general superintendent of the Company's Pacific steamship fleet. Records also fell on the Atlantic when the company's liner Queen Mary, which travelled between Greenock, Scotland, and Quebec City in 5 days, 17 hours and 20 minutes, even bettering the time hung up by the Duchess of Richmond on her previous trip from Britain to Quebec, which is a hundred miles shorter.

Speaking at a banquet given by the Saint John Board of Trade to inaugurate the service of the new Canadian Pacific steamer Princess Helen, on the Saint John-Dieppe route, E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the railway company, thought Canada would receive more quickly from other countries, even west of the border, to measure the responsible government's effort to reduce unemployment. He said the opinion of the railway company was that the best way to deal with the problem was to go to the source of the trouble.

It was the annual meeting of the Acadians expelled from Nova Scotia 175 years ago, assisted in the celebrations. Grand events recently, at which many Acadians living in the United States and Canada attended. The United States, France, Great Britain and Canada were represented at the celebrations which were held on the site of the old village and around the Memorial Church made even famous by Longfellow's poem of Evangeline.

In the provision of telephone communications in cities of 60,000 and over and in rural communities, Canada leads the world, according to statistics recently published. In these cities Canada has 242 telephones per 100 inhabitants against the United States 21.8. In 1929 Canadians made 211 conversations per head of population as compared with 230 in the United States, her nearest rival.

A total of 18,929,973 telegrams were transmitted by Canada in 1929, an increase of 1,127,753 over 1928. There are 350,000 routes of telegraph lines in Canada.

AYLMER PLANT GETS LARGE ORDER FROM ENGLAND

Direct effect of the announcement made by the National Government in England that beginning this week a protective tariff would be effective and that a preference would be given to British goods, was experienced in Aylmer, where the Carnation Company Limited received an order for Carnation milk from England.

This is the first order for export in some three years, when the Carnation company built and equipped a condenser in Holland, primarily to supply the British market from that plant and to save freight mileage.

Mr. J. P. Coyle, local manager, says that this one order received from England by cable will keep his plant going full time during the entire month of December, and believes other orders will follow. For the past few weeks many men have been laid off at the local condenser.

Farmers were asked to reduce their milk sent the factory by 25 per cent and in order to use up the milk the company has been making cheese. Today all the help are back at the Aylmer plant and in the near future Mr. Coyle expects that his factory will need every pound of milk that the farmers can produce.

Aylmer has the only factory of the Carnation Milk Company in Canada and the only factory in the British Empire. This district is greatly dependent on the prosperity of the dairy industry and a few export orders will mean many thousands of dollars' increase in revenue.
