CHRISTMAS GREETINGS TO THE PEOPLE OF JARVIS

THE BISHOP'S LETTER.
Dear Brethren:— "For, God who Commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ." 11. Cor. 4:6

The first Christmas came upon a distressed world. It was a time of darkness. Men's hearts were falling then for fear, large numbers of people were in slavery, and the old world was breaking up. Into that old world of confusion, strife and uncertainty came the light of the first Christmas Day in the stable of Bethlehem. I bid you turn your minds to Him who came in such a time and in such a way. Listen to the words of the Gospel for Christmas Day. "In Him was life, the life was the light of men. The Light shineth in the darkness and the darkness comprehended it not. . . . That was the true light which lighteth every man that cometh into the World." In the days through which we are passing we must lift our eyes to the light of Bethlehem. It is only as the Church turns to that Light that it can be guided and saved. Do not forget that we have no need to walk in darkness, and to stumble as those without the light. "He that followeth Me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life." In Europe, it is only the northern peoples who celebrate Christmas in anything like the same manner as we do. The idea of the Christmas-tree originated in Germany, and it is still the central feature of the German festival. Everyone, from the highest to the humblest in the land, has a Christmas tree in his home. As a rule the German tree is smaller than ours, and stands upon a table with the family presents piled around it. All the pleasant mystery of preparation is therefore weeks ahead; the German children begin to plan their Christmas presents, often made by themselves, as soon as the summer vacation is over.

In far northern Sweden and Norway the Christmas celebration is, if that is possible, more enthusiastic than ours and certainly more lasting. The feasting and merrymaking continue unabated during "second" Christmas and third day Christmas, December 26 and 27, but even then the fun is not over. Joyous and piercing that its beams reach as far as to-day. And at Christmas we turn into the midst of life's confusion to that most welcome light. This is the light that does not fail. It is not fallow now. It is guided and saved. When difficulties distress and anxieties gather, it shines the more brightly. "The Light shineth in darkness."
