Canadian Plane.

"Speaking of airplanes, do you know SK?" writes Jack Paterson in an article entitled "The Spirit of the North" published in the *Proctor MacLean's Magazine*. "Evergreen knows the Spirit of St. Louis, the DO X, the Columbia and other ships that have tipped over the red ink. But no one knows SK. Why? What is the story of this airplane? We know or call it what you like, the only answer seems to be: 'Because SK is Canadian.'"

SK, continues Mr. Paterson, has blazed more new air trails than any other Canadian plane and has a record of Arctic and wilderness flying that for sheer adventures and excitement could scarcely be paralleled anywhere.

In August 1928—SK started her career by blazing the first air trail from Hudson Bay westward through the barren, arctic wastes of the northern continent. She flew to Churchill, Chesterfield Inlet, Baker Lake, and on down a thousand miles of rivers and lakes, across a desolate expanse and through an arctic solitude never before disturbed by a motor's roar to Lake Athabasca; a jaunt that later was highly instrumental in winning for her pilot, 'Punch' Dickson, the coveted McKee Trophy. A fair start.

In October 1928, a survey was made of the new operating routes for airmail route. It was a ticklish and laborious mission, locating future 'dromes' and emergency landing fields over 1500 miles of country in the rough. Although the job might have been done by a number of capable pilots, SK got the call and made the survey. In November, with other machines, she carried out trial runs, and on December 10, 1928, under the veteran touch of Pilot W. J. "Buck" Buchanan, SK again somehow managed to make a close shave of the arctic wilderness. A noticeable feature is that on each of her history making journeys SK has had a different crew.

True Canadian Club.

The True Canadian Club was organized for 85 years and there are one whose business it is to lead public opinion in Haldimand County in all matters affecting the public welfare or public interests. This is to say that we view with considerable apprehension the introduction into the Haldimand County gas field of another large distributing company. If the field had unlimited possibilities we would say "More power them," but when the householders of Haldimand are in a position that they have for several recent years been fearful about the future supply, they have every reason for real worry now.

The editor of this paper has been a resident here throughout all the years since the late John Carmody drilled the very first gas well in Dunville, if not the first in the Haldimand field. In our opinion legislation should have been possible then placing an embargo on the export of natural gas, so that our own country would have been built up. Had such legislation been possible, there was enough gas in this field to have lasted forever—only for domestic use for the comfort and convenience of our own people, but for industrial purposes to have made Haldimand a hive of industry.

Let us review the history of natural gas in this county as we know it. In the early stages of the natural gas industry in Haldimand, many competing companies became interested, and in some cases parallel lines were laid to the cities of Brantford, Hamilton and St. Catharines. In their eagerness to get their share and get the money, the interests of the consumers in Haldimand were disregarded, and compressors or pumping stations were erected to pull the gas out in a hurry. This had to be operated under low pressure due to direct pumping. Another natural result was the diminished supply of gas because of the large volume taken in a comparatively short space of time, and because the drilling ventures were less successful, as the getting of a supply necessitated expansion into shallower fields of lower volume and lower rock pressure. This situation resulted in some companies having a shortage of supply, and the consumers were threatened, the people of Haldimand are going to be the goats, and we protest against it. We suggest that it is the duty of the Government to protect the interests of the common people, and that in this matter, the interests of the common people be in all the guarantees the Government can give us in safeguarding our natural gas supply, regardless of the interests of the big city of Hamilton.
