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REPORT OF HALDIMAND PUBLIC SCHOOL INSPECTOR FOR 1930

To the Honourable the Minister of Education: Sir—
I have the honor of presenting my annual report on the Public Schools of Haldimand County for the year 1930.

The Fabreville Lutheran School was the only new school built in the County during the year. Interior decorations were made in some twenty-four schools. A few frame schools were painted.

School premises are receiving more attention each year. One school on the premises during the year. Several had trees planted and shrubs. There have been planted in all school grounds, the result of which is a decided improvement in the appearance of the schools. Flower, perennial, biennial, and annuals are found in most grounds. The cultural value of fine premises is being duly recognized by all sections. The Women's Institutes of the County have been especially helpful in improving school grounds.

School property is being well cared for through vigilance and better supervision during the year. Most rural teachers now carry their lunch. Trustees will be advised to require that this provision be carried out.

TEACHERS
I wish to mention the exceedingly large percentage of change of teachers—33%. Of these 28% were replaced by other experienced teachers. While 5% were inexperienced, 74% of office of teachers is gradually improving in rural districts. This is in part due to the improved facilities provided for transportation to and from school to the station. An increasing percentage of the teachers are being retained. In some of the Townships of the County, in their schools as a rule I find the character of the work being done most commendable. The local supply of teachers does not exceed the demand. There have been maintained throughout the County. As the new year, a deeper and wider interest is being taken from year to year in the School Fair. Mr. A. G. Skinner, B.S.A. is an indefatigable worker and has established a name for himself. This fall prizes by their Soil Improvement Campaign for the whole County in which he interested the Junior Farmers' Association, the High Schools Agricultural Classes and the Rural Schools.

The teachers enjoyed a banquet at the Towers Building and a special theatre party was then provided. On Friday the meetings were held in the Assembly Room of the High School, Caledonia. Principal T. H. Hicks, B.A. gave an address of welcome to the teachers, followed by one from Mr. J. MacGowan on behalf of the Board of Trustees. Mr. W. J. Ferguson, the President, gave a very helpful address which was followed by an address on Teaching Music by the Schools by Mr. A. Bothwell of the Stratford Normal School. He stressed the cultural and disciplinary value of music. Miss M. Murray and Mr. H. C. Branton told of the work of a Manual training at the Saturday Classes at Hamilton Normal. Mr.
