My trip to Toronto and the Royal Winter Fair commenced on Tuesday morning, November 18th, when I boarded the train at Caledonia and continued to be full of interest and enjoyment until I left the train at Caledonia on Saturday evening. Upon my arrival at the Union Station I was met by an official, and together with the others of the 500 party was conducted through the subway which passes under Front Street to the Royal York Hotel, where we registered and were assigned to our rooms. A word may be said here on the splendid accommodation and service we received from the management of the Royal York during our stay in Toronto.

During the afternoon of the same day, we were taken on a tour of the United Farmers' Co-operative plant. Upon our arrival Mr. H. A. Gilroy, President, made a welcoming speech sketching the growth of the industry from small beginnings in 1914 to its present total of \$20,000,000. We then witnessed the very efficient handling of cream from its arrival at the factory to its departure as butter. The grading is an interesting feature—second grade cream, when detected, being churned separately so as to maintain the high standard of the No. 1 product. We also visited the egg grading plant, and the poultry dressing department which proved to be very interesting.

In the evening we were entertained at a banquet by the Ontario Government, at Hart House, University of Toronto. After being formally received by Colonel Kennedy and Mr. G. S. Henry, acting premier, for Ontario, we received an excellent meal, and then Colonel Kennedy, Major Weir, Mr. Henry and Canon Cook spoke on their political role and spoke interestingly to us Junior Farmers.

Wednesday morning began with a tour of the Harris Abattoir where we saw meat handled on an immense scale, but with clockwork like precision. This followed a tour of the Union Stock Yards led by the manager, Mr. Giles. This business is operated on 45 acres and boasts of a new two storey sheep building which cannot be duplicated on the American Continent. From 4 to 5 thousand head of cattle are handled on some of the busiest days and an average of 125 tons of hay are fed weekly. The party was entertained at luncheon by the Industrial Meat Packers, the meal being followed by speeches from the officials of these packing plants.

In the afternoon we witnessed the assembling of an automobile at the Willy-Overland Automobile factory. Great accuracy and care of details are necessary in many cases, and trained mind together with an accurate machine accomplish the seemingly impossible.

Following this tour we proceeded to the Massey-Harris Company's plant, and after supper, cafeteria style, there was a programme of speeches and moving pictures. Mr. Denton Massey was the chief speaker and the keynotes of his speech were, "Pride in one's work" and "Personal responsibility."

We then marched to the Royal Winter Fair where we witnessed the opening ceremony performed by Sir Robert Borden, and enjoyed the music. Continued on page 4
