Before an immense gathering, H. R. H. the Prince of Wales launched the 42,000-ton Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Britain, largest steamship in the British Empire, from the Chatham yards, June 11. The picture, snapped as the huge vessel had just taken the water, was transmitted to this continent by radio a few seconds later. Millions of listeners in all parts of the world heard the Prince make the address at the launching and also the address of E. W. ### Letter Received from An Old Jarvis Boy

The following letter was received last week from one of our old boys, Mr. Ray Morrow, and is heartily appreciated, not only by the recipients but also by his host of friends in and around the village, and it is with the greatest pleasure we publish same.

Plymouth, Calif. July 1, 1931  
Mr & Mrs Dan Steel,  
Jarvis, Ont.

Dear Mother & Dad Steel—  
This being July 1st, and being a loyal Canadian will celebrate the day in the best way I know out here by writing to the finest and best old Canadians I know in the persons of Mother and Dad Steel.

Received your welcome letter, which was forwarded to me to the above address from Glendale, Calif. I have been here since the 7th of May. Am back in the mountains twelve miles from this town on a gold mining property in which I have secured an interest, and either hope to make some real money out of it or go broke in the attempt. At the present time have met with very encouraging results and have secured some good values in gold. Have five men on the property besides myself and making considerable progress, and in a few months hope to know if it is a case of much or little.

This section of California is very pretty, the mountains being well and black oak, and several other varieties of trees. I am right in the heart of the old mining country which created so much excitement in 1849, of which we have read, though of course I do not remember that far back, but one sees the old diggings and workings and hears so many of the stories of those wild days, which lead to Calif. being discovered and settled to so large an extent as it is today. I am close to some of the large mines which have been working for seventy years and which have produced around \$100,000,000 in gold each in that time. I certainly will consider myself in luck if I can land on a small portion of this amount.

One also sees the old shacks and gaming halls and saloons still standing, but none of them are in the line where so much shooting and wild life was carried on, and also the old oak trees where lynching parties strung up the outlaws and desperadoes.

At one town near here, which is called Hangtown, on account of all the hangings taking place in the early days, they are having an old time 1849 celebration, the citizens are all dressed in old time costumes of 80 years ago, both men and women, boys and girls. The men with beards and sideburns, the women in hoop skirts, etc., and it is quite a sight, when roaming around the town one sees the same old buildings and the people in costume that seems to roll your life back 80 years of olden days. They even try keeping the scene funny to think of her in any other way than Zelmia.

Must ring off for now. Letters addressed to Plymouth, California, will reach me O. K.

### MRS. H. LEATHERDALE STRUCK BY MOTOR CAR

On Sunday evening last about 8:30 p.m., a very serious accident occurred on the Dover Jarvis highway, about 1/4 mile south of Jarvis, when Thos. Boyce of Port Dover, travelling south, ran into Mrs. Henry Leatherdale, who was driving a horse and buggy in the same direction. According to Mr. Boyce, the lights from a car coming from the opposite direction blinded him and he did not see the horse and buggy.

Mrs. Leatherdale was thrown clear of the wreckage, and received a very serious cut across the top of her head, which required several stitches to close, besides a severe shaking up. The car driven by Mr. Boyce turned over on its side, shattering the glass, and damaging the car considerably. Mr. Boyce suffering back injuries, although it is believed his injuries are minor.

The other car, driven by a Hamilton man, took the ditch, to avoid hitting the Boyce car, and it was reported it turned over three times, however, none of the occupants were seriously injured, although the car is still in a local garage undergoing repairs.
