Where Jobs Seek Men

Free Access to Land the Reason
British East Africa has been dis-
covered to be a white man's country
It has an area of 189,838 square
miles and a population of 4,000,000,
of whom some 3,200 are Europeans.
It has a Labor Problem.—The exact
opposite to our own. With them it
is never a question of finding jobs
for men, but always of finding men
for jobs.

Notwithstanding that the natives
are without Trade Unions, Labor
Burdens, or Unemployment Insur-
ance, they are able to defy all the
efforts of the white employers to
exploit their labor and can, and do
refuse to work for them. Naturally,
the white men who are interested in
developing the country, and who
recognize the truth that no develop-
ment is possible without labor, are
concerned about what they are plea-
sed to call the "laziness of the nige-
rs," and, with a view to discover-
ing some satisfactory solution of
their Labor Problem, a Commission
was appointed
