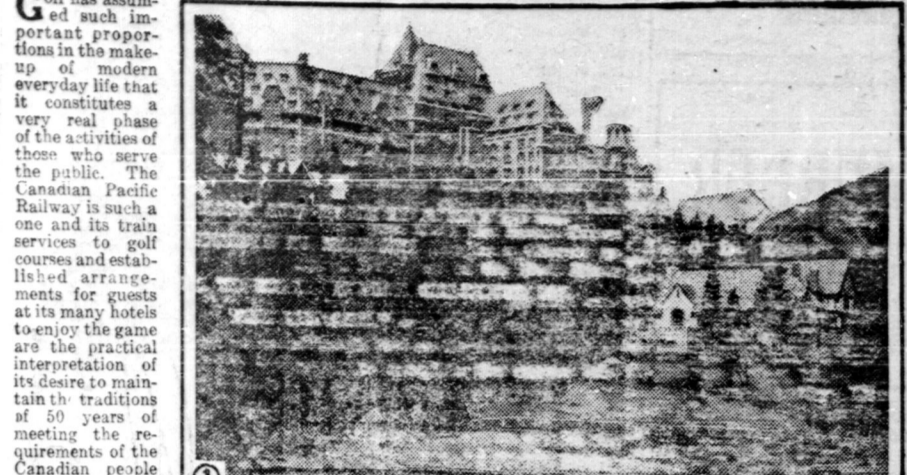

No sensible person will argue that our banking system cannot be improved, that those who direct it are infallible nor that at times credit is withheld which could properly be granted. Imperfections are bound to crop out where authority has to be delegated through the long channel of intermediaries stretching from head office to the most remote branch or agency.

While these imperfections are almost wholly administrative they annually give rise to movements, in Parliament and out, which would uproot the whole present day banking system. The 1931 move in this direction has just been proposed by Parliament. It proposed the creation of a central bank for Canada. Discussing the structure of banking in this country Premier Bennett did not claim perfection for it and forecast that time and conditions would undoubtedly see change, but he did show most conclusively that in the service rendered the nation and in the security afforded depositors the Canadian system was as satisfactory and as sound as any.

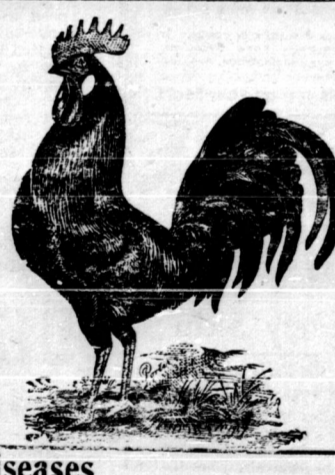
