The Value of Waterworks
 A Municipal Waterworks System is of paramount importance to every progressive community, and, if properly installed and given careful supervision, rapidly becomes a valuable asset to the community. The safeguard of the public's health by the elimination of possible epidemics unquestionably ranks first and foremost in the list of community needs. Municipal Water Supply Systems are continually checked for impurities by the Department of Health, and a supply derived from a single source can be, and is, under the strictest supervision at all times and proper care exercised to maintain the required standard of purity. This is not always possible where a community is securing its supply from individual wells, any one of which may and often does cause contamination in other wells.
 Municipalities without an adequate supply of pure water are at a distinct disadvantage in their endeavor to attract industrial plants to locate in their community. One of the first questions asked is invariably, "How about your water supply, and what fire protection can you offer if we locate here?"
 Statistics indicate that many industrial firms are seeking locations in smaller communities and that the proportion desiring to secure locations in smaller communities is rapidly approaching the percentage of new industries established in urban centres.
 It is also of interest to know that whether you have a Waterworks System or not you are paying for it just the same. Fire insurance rates are based largely on the protection maintained in the event of fire. If good protection is available and maintained in accordance with the requirements of the Fire Underwriters' Association the risk is minimized and the rate of fire insurance is accordingly reduced. In many communities where Waterworks Systems have been installed, however, the annual charge paid by the consumers for the water supply.
 IT MAY BE OF INTEREST TO KNOW:
 The daily charge for water for the average dwelling would be approximately five cents (.05c).
 The daily charge for commercial services would be approximately eight cents (.08c).
 The total daily revenue required to take care of a sinking fund for the retirement of the thirty-year debentures at 4 1/2% maintenance and other incidental expenses, would be approximately \$11.05.
 The amount chargeable to the general tax payers for the daily maintenance of fire hydrants and for water used by the Municipality for other municipal uses would amount to \$4.11.
 Briefly a system to provide service to the existing potential consumers in the Municipality would require approximately 17,741 feet of cast iron water main, 90 fire hydrants, an elevated storage tank capacity of holding a reserve supply of water of approximately 75,000 gallons, a development of approximately 250,000 gallons per day equipped with anti-bye pumping equipment to deliver the water to the elevated storage tank or deliver the water to the distribution mains.
