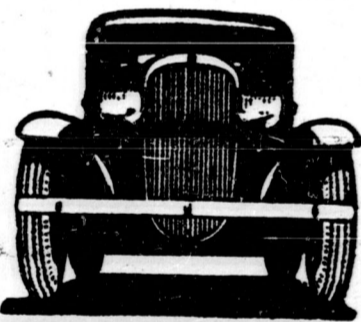

POULTRY MEETING

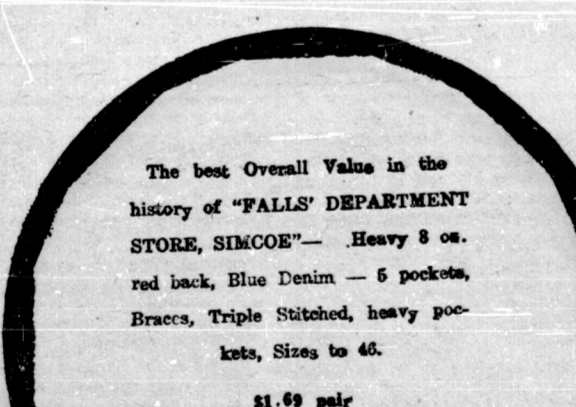
