Conversion Bonds

The offer does not involve the raising of any new money, but a penny will be added to the national debt of Canada in consequence of the issue of conversion bonds.

A total of more than one billion dollars of bonds reaches maturity with- in the next 3 1/2 years. This total is made up of about \$52,900,000 War Loan 5% Bonds due October 1, 1931; \$73,000,000 Renewal Loan 5 1/2% Bonds due November 1, 1932; \$440,000,000 Victory Loan 5 1/2% Bonds due November 1, 1933; and \$512,000,000 Victory Loan 5 1/2% Bonds due November 1, 1934.

Holders of bonds of these issues are being given the opportunity of continuing their investment over a longer term in the direct obligations of the Dominion Government.

They will not lose anything in the way of interest payments or income tax ex-emption by exchanging for bonds of the 1931 Conversion Loan. It is ex- plained that the new bonds will carry coupons entitling holders to receive up to the date of the matu- rity of their old bonds, the same interest payments and tax free privi- leges as they would enjoy if they held their War Loan or Victory Bonds until the actual date of matu- rity in each case.

For the remainder of the term of the 1931 Con- version Loan Bonds, they will carry in- terest at the rate of 4 1/2% per an- num, which in the opinion of lead- ing investment bankers, is the com- paratively generous return in view of the interest rates now pre- vailing in the London and New York markets.

Conversion Applications are now being invited up to a total of \$250,000,000 of the new bonds, it is an- nounced, however, that the Min- ister of Finance reserves the right to increase or decrease this amount, in his discretion. Subscription lists will open today and will close on or before the 31st of May, as may be decided by the Government.
