Ottawa—Ten men who previously have represented the Dominion at the National Rifle Association's Empire meet and eight competitors who are making the trip for the first time have been named for Canada's N.R.A. Bisley Team.

Prominent among the veterans is Lieutenant Desmond Burke, former King's Prize-winner and runner-up on two occasions.

Others who are to represent Canada are the young. Aggregates at Bisley, considered by many a more outstanding win than the King's Prize, is making his eighth consecutive trip—a record never before equalled.

Lieut.-Col. J. A. Hopa, D.S.O., M.C., of Perth, Ont., is commandant of the team, and Captain H. S. Solman, Ottawa, is adjutant.
