Jarvis Celebration Huge

Success: Record Attendance

After an earnest effort on the part of the Jarvis Board of Trade supported by the well known organizing ability of the "Jarvis Booster Club," the third annual Victoria Day celebration went over with a "Bang," and on Tuesday morning they were each shaking hands with themselves and vying with each other as to the relative merits of each organization.

The weather on Monday morning looked threatening, after an all night rain, and the ardour of the baseball enthusiasts was somewhat clouded, but as the morning wore away, so did the clouds, and before noon, it was known that the "Diamond" would be the scene of the opening of the Haldimand County League games.

The Calithumpian Parade was late in starting, owing to the rain, but when they did start—oh boy, wasn't she a hummer. Everything from the Irish Washerwoman to a full size demonstration of the Jarvis Water Works System. The parade was so beautifully displayed from the horseless carriage of the Straw Motors Limited, was the admiration of the many tourists who lined the streets, while the signs of the times were very characteristic.

The parade was very characteristic of the "Spirit of Depression" and by Sam the Barber, as the "Lazy Farmer." Thousands of people viewed the parade from every angle, house-tops, telephone poles, trees, automobiles, in fact every inch of space within the corporation limits was utilized, and cameras were constantly clicking during the parade.

The novelty softball game following the parade, was a disappointment and remarked by many that it was well worth the price of admission for the whole lot. Arthur Blight umpired the game until removed by the management.

Arthur called so many foul balls, that the crowd became so offensive, that an attempt was made to force his retirement from the game, the result was a free-for-all fight which ended the game, but not until a number of casualties were reported.

In the afternoon Jarvis and Selkirk of the H.A.A. Haldimand County League teams took the field. This game ended in a tie, 1-1. The game was played on a very uneven field, the final score being 1-1 in favor of the home team, but the score does not indicate the brand of ball played. Selkirk got all the breaks, and for a new team, played a good game at times, and it is predicted that before the season is over they will have a better account of themselves.

Donville-Caledonia played the second game, and for real snappy ball this game held the crowd until long after six o'clock for the finish, which ended 4-2 in favor of the Donville Mud-Cats. From the brand of ball playing exhibited by the Donville boys it looks like that Bill Fry has at last assembled a team that will be strong contenders for the Haldimand County championship.

The jitter dancing in the afternoon attracted large crowds, and the roped off area in the arena was well patronized, and in the evening a bumper
