Some froth will rise to the surface of the mixture of ground coffee and boiling water. This is to be skin med off immediately with the wooden spoon. The coffee, still in the earthenware jug, then is allowed to stand in a warm place for six minutes to allow the grounds to settle.

A dash of cold water will assist this settling. The beverage then is ready to drink, although the Committee states that a small pinch of salt will still further improve the


