ROYAL WINTER FAIR, 1931

Story of the Royal Winter Fair in brief paragraphs.
DATE—November 18-26, 8 days.
PLACE—Coliseum and Royal Fair Buildings, Toronto.

10th ROYAL—Commemorative Show to recall, as an encouragement to the Canadian people, the renewed confidence the Royal gave to agriculture when it was founded in the depressed after-war years.

BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION—Every Boy and Girl in Canada whose tenth birthday falls on or between November 18-26 to receive a personal birthday card from the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, if written for, giving name, address and date of birth—a Dominion wide birthday party.

ROYAL OBJECTS—To promote Canada's basic industry, agriculture; to be a national medium for drawing the nine provinces more closely together; to set a national standard of excellence for agriculture.

CHARACTER—Distinctly national and all-Canadian with high national value in the awards.

VICE-REGAL PATRONAGE—His Excellency the Governor-General is a patron of the Royal and will attend on Monday evening, November 22nd.

PROVINCIAL DAYS—To promote provincial interests and enable products from all parts of Canada to be exhibited.

EXTENT—25 acres. All indoors—15,000 head of livestock exhibited. ENTRIES—In 1930 in all departments totaled 16,529. These represented 2,401 exhibitors. Entries from Alberta, 421; British Columbia, 55; Manitoba, 491; New Brunswick, 107; Nova Scotia, 82; Ontario, 13,142; Quebec, 525; Prince Edward Island, 22; Saskatchewan, 362; the United Kingdom, 797; Ireland, 89; Germany, Hungary 54; and Sweden.

15. Moved by Mr. Gloyd, seconded by Mr. Bird, that we do now adjourn to allow the committee to meet. Carried.
16. Moved by Mr. Anderson, seconded by Mr. Bird, that we do now return to business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.
17. Moved by Mr. Laidlaw, seconded by Mr. Anderson, that the report of the Building Committee be received and read. Carried.

New Cemetery Act Comes Into Force

Ontario's new Cemetery Act—an act which was passed by the last session of the Legislature, provided for commission, control and supervision of Cemeteries, and placing, primarily, at a clean-up of the hundreds of neglected burying grounds that are to be found in this province at the present time—is now effectually in operation, having been proclaimed at the last council of the Henry Cabinet.

In part, the new act provides: (1) There shall be in every county and provincial judicial district a commission to be known as the cemetery commission; (2) in the case of a county the commission shall consist of three members, one of whom shall be appointed by the lieutenant-governor-in-council, and the other two members to be appointed annually by the county council at its first meeting, and in the case of a provincial judicial district the commission shall consist of the judge of the district, the sheriff and one other person to be named by the lieutenant-governor-in-council; (3) the commission shall be charged with the general supervision of cemeteries and burying grounds in the county or district; and (4) the commission shall be paid such fees as may be fixed from time to time by order-in-council and shall also be entitled while engaged in the performance of their duties to reasonable and necessary traveling and other expenses and such fees and expenses shall be payable by the county or district treasurer upon the certificate of the chairman of the commission.

Special Clause

There is also a special clause in the act, regarding refusal or neglect to maintain cemeteries, which reads as follows:

"Where the council of a municipality neglects or refuses to properly maintain a cemetery under the provisions of this section, the council shall give notice in writing to the corporation to do whatever is necessary to do whatever is necessary to the corporation directing the corporation to do whatever is necessary to the corporation should be done by the proper maintenance thereof, and in case of disobedience to any such order the commission may cause the necessary work to be done and the treasurer of the municipality shall pay the cost of such work, upon the order of the chairman of the commission, to the person entitled thereto."

A complete survey of Ontario's neglected cemeteries was made by Mr. J. W. S. McCullough, chief inspector of health, during the last year of Hon. Dr. Forbes Godfrey's administration as provincial health minister.
