OFFICERS' ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

An interesting meeting was held at the Town Hall, Rainha Centre, on Tuesday last when eighty of the branch and district officers of the County Women's Institute gathered for their Annual Conference.

After the usual opening exercises Mrs. J. C. Payne, County president, referred to the wonderful progress during the past year in membership and finances. A new branch was organized at St. John's, Lethbridge, between Cayuga and Caledonia. There are now thirty branches in the county with a total membership of twelve hundred, Haldimand being the largest district in the province.

Mrs. D. Parkinson, county treasurer, reported finances in a flower-strewn condition. During the past year expenses were paid for the judging team of four girls to the C.N.F. Substantial prizes were given to girls winning highest points in costume classes. A worth while donation was given to County Musical Festival. Medals were presented to the winners of the public speaking contests at school fairs and to the pupils obtaining the highest standing on Entrance examinations in total marks and Canadian History. Christmas boxes were supplied each ward of the Children's Aid. This is being repeated the coming season, a small gift being sent each inmate of the House of Refuge as well.

As to funds for the coming year each branch is paying seventy-five cents towards the expenses of the Hamilton Convention, also a tax of 25c per member to cover Federation fees and contribution to District funds.

Although Haldimand is considered an agricultural county, yet the manufacturing industries are considerable. Mrs. P. Bacher, convener on Industries showed samples of goods manufactured by the Cayuga Textile She 144 of the Monarch Co. of Dunville using 120,000 pounds of wool each year in the making of garments, the evening factories of Cayuga and Dunville, the Steel factory making frames and gates, the Gypsum and stay with their well-known wall boards, the stone quarries and flour mills. Reference was made of a shipment of honey from Jarvis via the Panama Canal to Edmonton.

Mrs. Beckerson reporting on Relief showed a spirit of neighborliness throughout the entire county as well as to needy citizens of the north.

Mrs. J. L. Mitchener, in her report urged the appointing of Home and School Committees and spoke of the wonderful development of musical training in the schools, over forty rooms at present having instruction. The attendance of women at the annual school meeting was advocated.

Mrs. E. Carter on Historical Research, suggested the establishing of a county museum, telling of many offerings of relics for a collection.

Mrs. D. J. Gibson on Agriculture explored the cutting of trees along the highways by hydro and telephone companies. She urged the use of Canadian farm products for Canadian people.

Mr. A. G. Skirrow, Agricultural representative, told of the advance in school fairs, the entire having increased by twelve hundred over former years. A soil test of the county is now being carried on which promises much benefit to agriculture.

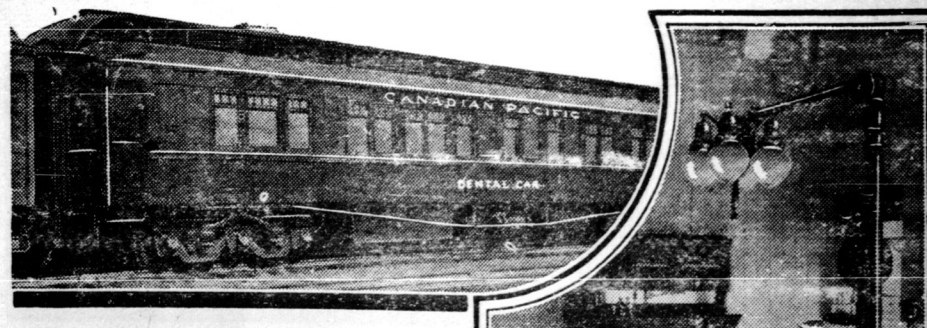

Dental Services to Northern Outposts



Designed for use in Northern Ontario and constructed at the Angus Shops of the Canadian Pacific Railway and remodelled and equipped at the expense of the Rosedale Chapter of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, this railway dental car will be maintained by the Ontario Department of Health and will have running rights over all lines in Northern Ontario. The car was handed over by the railway at the North Toronto station recently to a representative gathering including Hon. G. S. Henry, Premier of Ontario; Hon. Dr. J. M. Robb, Minister of Health; Dr. W. J. Bell, deputy Minister of Health; Dr. F. J. Conboy, director of dental services for the Ontario Health department; and delegates from the 65 chapters of the I.O.D.E. in Toronto.

The car is complete in every way as a dental consulting office, fully equipped, with dentist and nurse attached, having their own quarters, with waiting room, dental chair and all accessories as in the most modern dental consulting rooms. Electric light, hot and cold running water, electric accessories are contained in the car which will furnish dental service to children and adults throughout Northern Ontario.
