### YOUR TEETH & YOUR HEALTH

The comfort that comes from a clean mouth with healthy teeth, and the ability to chew properly with sound teeth are not the only important points to be considered with regard to the relationship of teeth and health.

In the mouth of many adults, there is present some chronic infection about the teeth which may lead to damage of some vital organ of the body by causing disease of that organ.

Infected teeth are a menace at all times. There are certain individuals who harbor such an infection for years with apparently no serious results. There is, however, no way of foretelling in which individual, who has an infection about the teeth, there will occur infections in other parts of the body as a result of the infection present in the tooth.

The germs responsible for the infection about the teeth may be picked up and carried by the bloodstream, and deposited in any part of the body. Here they multiply and set up a chronic infection similar to the one which they caused in the mouth.

Just how serious this is depends upon where the infection occurs. It is obvious that if it should be a valve of the heart which is damaged as a result of such an infection, the secondary infection is much more serious than was the primary one in the tooth.

As we have indicated, no one can say what will happen in any particular case. That is why the dentist extracts infected teeth in order to remove the infection from the mouth where it is a constant menace because it may lead to serious damage in other parts of the body.

Once tooth infection has occurred, it is necessary that, as a preventive measure against other conditions, the infected tooth be properly dealt with. It would have been better still, however, to have gone one step further back, which would have brought us to prevention of infection about the tooth.

Healthy teeth in adult life are the reward of proper care from the time of birth on through the years of growth. Next to importance to diet come cleanlines and regular visits to the dentist in order that serious trouble may be prevented by early treatment.

A child should be taken to the dentist, not because he has a toothache, but in order that he may never have one. If parents will cooperate with their dentist, beginning with the child's primary teeth, it will be possible for them, in most cases, to secure for their children healthy teeth throughout adult life, and besides, free them from the dangers which accompany infected teeth.

whisked away to the beautiful home of an old school mate, Mrs. Jessie Calder, formerly Miss Jessie Brown of Mount Forest, Ont., whom we had not seen for over thirty years; and this meeting, after such a long suspense can be better imagined than described.

Mrs. Calder, whose husband died in Lipton, Sask., on Christmas Day, eight years ago, has changed much in appearance, but still retains her old time vigor and vitality.

Next morning we took a side trip to Saskatoon nearly two hundred miles north of Regina, for the purpose of seeing the new eight hundred thousand dollar school for the deaf, which was opened for the first time on September 28th, last. This school, which the leading deaf

of Western Canada pushed forward to completion is considered to be one of the finest educational institutions of its kind in the world.

While in that city we were warmly entertained by Mr. A. J. D. Wilton, Local Supervisor of the school, and a former Toronto boy, and his charming young wife. We made this jolly couple adieu the same day and again boarded the flier at midnight for Regina where we arrived at six in the morning. We put in the whole day taking in the sights of Regina. One thing that greatly impressed us in this city was the way the streets were named. Nearly all of which bear the names of prominent cities and towns in Canada, such as Toronto, St. Peterboro St., Hamilton Ave., Lindsay, Crescent and so on. At 5.30 p.m. on August 28th, we left our very King Regina friends who had gathered at the station to see us off and once more boarded the Dominion on another night run of 475 miles to Calgary, Alberta. On the way up we arrived in that large and beautiful city, Moose Jaw, where we spent an hour and a half before dark, thus we were able to get a good idea of the size and picturesque. Moose Jaw derived its name in a very curious way. Away back in the past ages when it was an Indian settlement the Red Skins found the moose that then roamed in immense herds a very valuable food and as a consequence, large numbers were slaughtered annually and their heads piled in heaps all around upon the ground where this city now stands hence its name.

We also passed through the cities of Lethbridge and Medicine Hat ere we pulled into Calgary at 7.55 next morning. What a pretty city is Calgary, the largest city between Winnipeg and Vancouver.

To our amusement, this city has had some of the most beautiful private homes we ever saw, built in English, Spanish and Japanese style, and as a result of the architectural design, they even surpass those seen in Toronto's famous "Rosedale".

Next week we will continue the story of this wonderful trip.

Through the 115 degrees of summer from five in the night at night, digging, hauling, with only a mud in which to house their possessions—when some all these things, a people living on Cannon Island, with an irrigation scheme equal to any on the Orange River, with lands bearing unprecedented crops, without the Government having to expend one penny on improvements.

He decided on the wisest course, to allow these squatters to stay—and in due course it was decided that they should rent their farms at 5c each for the first year, rising on a sliding scale to \$10 after the fifth year.

With a definite promise of title in the near future, the squatters of Cannon Island assumed a new status and the Bestuie set about carrying many projects to completion. They bought timber, iron plates, rivets, bolts and steel cable, and built the largest point on the Orange River without assistance from any engineer or tradesman. It cost them \$500 to complete, labor costs being absolutely nil. This provided them with a means of outlet for their produce, and money began to flow into Cannon Island.

The mud and reed huts in which large families had stayed during the couple of years which they needed to 'settle' the island were handed over to the cattle, and comfortable brick homes were built in a more suitable position—on a building of running down the centre of the island, where even the highest floods could not reach them. A Government valuation of the improvements which settlers had made to the island was placed at \$7,500.

It must be remembered that these were men and women who had absolutely nothing when they started to
