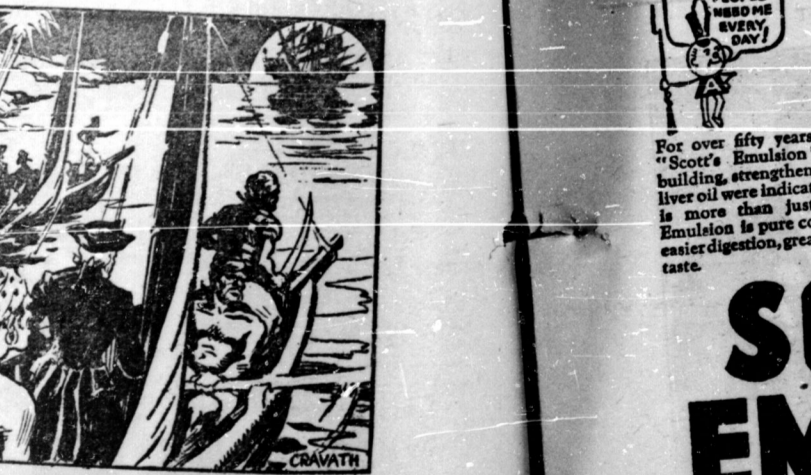
NAUGHTY MARIETTA
