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THIS WEEK ON PARLIAMENT HILL

Ottawa, July 26th—Canadian politicians this week devoted themselves to perfecting organizations in their parties and preparing the most developments in the campaign that will end in a general election.

On Thursday night Hon. W. L. King, opens his campaign with the first of three radio addresses.

Speculation runs high as to the future of his policy. Several of the Liberal platform will contain reforms that are being advocated by the Conservatives and Mr. Stevens' Reconstructionists.

On the eve of the Liberal campaign opening Premier R. B. Bennett will end his radio. Immediate reconstruction of his cabinet will be undertaken and completed within ten days.

Authoritative Ottawa says that the government wants a six-week campaign and the election date, probably September 23, may be announced by the Premier before the voters' lists of 6,000,000 names are completed on August 15th.

The Liberals say in the smaller Crit victory of Premier-elect Walter M. Lea of Prince Edward Island.

Black rust has darkened the spring wheat crop prospects in Minnesota. It was now predicted that only half of the estimated crop of 275,000,000 bushels will be harvested.

Canada's answer to the Japanese flag against Canadian goods is a recent duty on Japanese goods.

It is expected that unless some agreement is reached before August 5th it will mean an increase of 50 cents a dozen in the cost of manufacturing full-fashioned hosiery and from five to seven cents a yard in annual Canada imports \$3,600,000.

A city of beggars. Nanking, China's new capital with a population of 700,000 has, it is roughly estimated, more than 100,000 beggars.

More cars. Production of an estimated 15,745 new cars during June showed an increase of 14 per cent. A total of 15,745 new cars were turned out.

The Social Credit League has found new opposition for the provincial election in the Economic Safety League.

The social credit advocates charge that the Safety League is being partially financed from Great Britain.

With Manitoba strikers returning to their homes and work camps in Ontario headed toward Capital Hill along two different routes.

The strikers are not expected to reach Ottawa until sometime during the week when they will seek an audience with government officials.

The ground is still being prepared for trade negotiations between Canada and the United States.

Hope is held that these negotiations if successful will add Canadian cattlemen. A tariff of 2 1/2 cents a pound on cattle under 700 pounds and three cents over that weight entering the United States from Canada has practical effect.

Portugal has been held in check by the United States against Canadian cattle the annual export to the United States amounted to 260,000 head.

The Russian Cossack lumber industry continues to suffer extensively from the collapse of the Chinese buying power and from Russian competition in the United Kingdom.

In Alberta the political situation has become further entangled by the decision of the Social Credit League to support the Conservative government.

At Winnipeg following swiftly on an attempt to muster another mass march to Ottawa 400 strikers agreed to disband.

FORMER ONTARIO BOY NOW A DAKOTA JUDGE

Career of James McCarter Is Reviewed by English Periodical

James McCarter, a native of Jarvis, Ont. now a lawyer and politician of Edmunds County, South Dakota has made progress in the United States which has attracted attention to him from Great Britain.

He was educated at his home town public school and at Simcoe high school before taking his law course at the University of Valparaiso, Indiana, where he graduated in 1899.

He went to Bowditch, S.D. in 1900 and says Town & Country, "aided the farmer and the laboring man struggling against the tide in this new country."

In 1914 he was nominated for Governor of South Dakota by the Democrats, but lost by a small margin.

Wilson appointed him assistant registrar of the U.S. treasury, which office he held for five years.

He married Madeline J. Jacobson, of Bowditch, and has three daughters.—Toronto Daily Star.

The 1820 certificate reads: "I certify that Mrs. Secord Wife of James Secord of Queenston, Esquire, did in the month of June 1813 come to the Beaver dam and communicate to me information of an intended attack to be made by the Enemy upon the Detachment then under my command there, which occasionally occupied a large Stone House at that place. This information was substantially correct, and a detachment of the 2nd Regiment of the 100th Regiment of the morning of the Second day after the information was given to me the Command of Lt. Colonel Boerstler, which Detachment was captured by the Enemy."

Mrs. Secord arrived at my Station about Sunset of an excessively warm day, after having walked twelve miles, which I at the time thought was an exertion which a person of her slender frame and delicate appearance was unequal to.

"(signed) James FitzGibbon Capt. Half Pay, late Campaign York, 28th Feby. 1820."

"This definitely places the date of Laura Secord's journey as the 22nd of June and the time of her arrival at FitzGibbon's quarters at about sunset."

The argument of critics of the Secord tradition, as represented by Professor W. Stewart Wallace, appears to be based on two assumptions: (1) that Laura Secord did not have secured any information of importance before the American operation orders were issued at Fort George on the 23rd of June (probably in the afternoon), because until then there was nothing to report, and that after that date she could not have reached FitzGibbon in time to be of service; (2) that FitzGibbon could not have had any knowledge of the impending attack before the 22nd of June.
