A Government Called To First Game of Again Active O.R.S.A. Play-Offs Action--And Acting Won By Jarvis

By Mark C. Senn

Choas and discouragement are not too extreme terms to describe the economic situation in Canada when the Conservative Government was called to office in 1930. Depression was flaunting its dismal evidences. Agricultural prices were dropping. In addition the Dominion was the dumping ground of manufactured merchandise and farm products from countries with depreciated currencies or lower living standards, shipped, in the majority of cases, with little or no regard for the cost of production.

The situation was gloomy indeed, and it has been truthfully said that Canada turned to the Conservative party in its darkest economic hour. Unquestionably the element of greatest discouragement to the citizenship prior to the election had been the inaction of the King Government in the crisis. As each new situation developed—and increased the imperative need that something should be done—the government simply failed to act. Almost every day brought an increase in the tariff of some foreign country against Canada and the loss of another market. Yet the King ministry remained anathetic, without definite policy, just waiting for the storm to pass. It even denied what was so tragically apparent in the cities across the Dominion that there was any national unemployment problem.

In the circumstances if was no wonder that the Canadian people

In the circumstances it was no wonder that the Canadian people turned to the Conservative party for leadership out of their difficulties. They had no alternative. And when they accepted office Mr. Bennett and his colleagues had no misconception as to what was expected from them. They knew they were called to action. And they proceeded to act—with a promptness and a decisiveness which drew tribute from even the Liberal press across the Dominion.

The Bennett Government assumed office on August 7, 1930 One month and one day later—on September 8—it summoned Parliament and presented to it a comprehensive program for meeting the emergent economic crisis into which the country had landed.

Actually, it is doubtful if ever Parliament has accomplished as much in such a brief time as was done at that special session in 1930. The Government's program was three-fold. In the first place, as an urgently needed palliative for the distress abroad in the land, it appropriated \$20,000,000 to be spent at once on useful relief projects. Secondly, as a belated show of national spirit and independence to nations which had already pushed up insurmountable trade barriers against the Dominion, the tariff was increased. Finally, to relieve the producers of Canada from unfair competition which they should never have had to meet, the dumping duties were increased from a maximum of 15 to 50 percent. and an embargo was placed upon goods coming from nations which were not signatory to the Treaty of Versailles. This latter step had the effect of excluded the products of forced Soviet labor.

At one stroke—and within the short space of three weeks—this legislative program accomplished more for Canada than had been achieved in the entire year and a half of apathy by the King Government since the depression had given its first warning

ly, discovered its mistake when it found its protection cancelled overnight.

Altogether, jobs for between 25,000 and 30,000 Canadian workers were provided by the tariff changes which the special Autumn session of Parliament made. In addition, there was an immediate indirect reaction. Foreign countries, notably the United States, realized that the long era of outside exploitation of the Canadian market was over, and that if they desired to hold their trade here, they would have to do their manufacturing within the Dominion. Puring the next year the greatest movement of branch factories to Canada ever witnessed got actively under way. No less than 57 concerns established plants here, conserving to thousands of Canadian workmen the employment which purchases in their own country created.
