THIS WEEK ON PARLIAMENT HILL

Aug. 14.—The plea of the Wheat, it appeared at Ottawa this week-end would be effective in having the election date shifted to September 30th or October 7th. Revising the voters' lists were also cited a factor in making the date later than September 23rd which had previously been regarded as the probable date. It has always been the practice to await the completion of the printed lists before issuing the election proclamation although such is not compulsory by law. The announcement of the poll date it is expected that Mr. Bennett will make known the members of the ministry which will support the election fight. At least the cabinet changes are looked for and may be others. The Conservative leader, it is predicted, will devote a good part of his efforts to radio addresses from his own centres. His health, it is thought, will not permit an extensive campaign. He is at present working on a series of radio talks which will precede his platform addresses.

King in Ontario

The platform campaign of Opposition leader Rt. Hon. William L. Mackenzie King, which were presented by three radio addresses, opened in Kingston last week and was resumed in western Ontario this week. Mr. King is now enlarging on various points of the Liberal man's program. Mr. Bennett's greeting to the 400 Ontario trekkers who reached Ottawa this week was exactly what was expected. No food or shelter would be provided by the government, Mr. Bennett told the delegation of ten in an interview Saturday which lasted only a few minutes. Ewart Humphries, Toronto, spokesman for the delegation protested that he and his aides had not sufficient time to prepare for the conference. The Premier told the committee of nine men and one woman bluntly that their seven-point program was not the object of their trek in the government's belief. It was organized rather to embarrass the government and the government had no intention of being embarrassed "at our own expense." Before the trek started warning had been given that the government would not provide food or shelter for them in Ottawa, Mr. Bennett pointed out. Among the appointments made by the Cabinet in Ottawa this week were those of Charles H. Brand, Ottawa, as chairman of the Civil Service Commission and Bennett J. Rogers, appointed to the provincial guarantee, as assistant deputy minister of finance. Appointments to the Bench in Saskatchewan are: P. H. Gordon, Regina, appointed to the provincial Appeal Court; A. E. Bennet, Saskatoon, District Court Judge for Saskatchewan; J. A. M. Patrick, Yorkton, District Judge for Mooseomin; and J. F. Bryan, Regina, District Court Judge for Saskatchewan.

London—Pears of racial strife as a result of the threatening Italian-Ethiopian dispute are becoming increasingly widespread. Demonstrations have increased against Italy's apparent determination to invade the last of the world's unconquered black kingdoms since the League of Nations' Council on August 3 provided for arbitration and then adjourned until September. Hope for the prevention of the international problem taking on a racial aspect lies in Ethiopia's appeal to the Christian world. The mutual bonds of Christianity may overcome racial differences.

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Washington, D.C.

Washington, D.C.—Whether or not the United States citizens will have the protection of the new Neutrality Bill depends largely on the temperaments of the Congressmen and Senators who are trying desperately to complete their sessions. The new bill which has received wide support provides power for the President to place an embargo on loans and arm shipments to either or both sides in the conflict. The Luntian incident is recalled by the provision which forbids Americans travelling on the vessels of belligerent 90 days after a state of war has been proclaimed. Submarines are prohibited from being used in the use of American vessels in carrying munitions, even to neutral countries.
