The Roll Call got a very good response after which the first Novell was sung. A letter of thanks for milk received was read. It was decided to take advantage of the "Furnishing Furniture Project" with classes to be held in the spring. Mrs. Clarence Smith and Mrs. Holtermann were chosen as leaders for the class as the invitation coming from the Nanticoke Branch to join with them for the social evening in January was accepted. It was also decided to hold a community night in the Jarvis Town Hall on January the 10th with Peter S. Banks tender was accepted in part by the council.
