# THE JARVIS RECORD

**Hon. H. H. Stevens to Lead New Political Party**

Ex-Minister Announces Definite Reform Policy To Be Basis of New Group — Candidate to be Placed In Every Federal Riding Throughout The Dominion

Clubs to be Formed In All Municipalities for Organization Purposes.

Political Ottawa was shocked on Monday when it became definitely known that the Hon. H. H. Stevens, Ex-Minister of Trade and Commerce, had announced that he would lead a new party in the forthcoming general elections. Although it has been generally conceded that Mr. Stevens would never again be a force in the Conservative ranks, it was hardly felt that he would lead a new party in the Dominion. Apparently he has had this end in view since his resignation from the Prime Minister's office in July 1934, when considerable controversy sprang up between them over the Stevens pamphlet, reviewing the offerings of the evening. The Stevens Commission, on which he served as chairman, criticizing several Canadian firms. His action in this case was termed "treason" by the Prime Minister who demanded a resignation. Mr. Stevens refused to do so and hence his resignation from his cabinet post.

It was felt that sooner or later Mr. Stevens would again find a small understanding with Mr. Bennett and they would work together in the interests of the Conservative party but Mr. Stevens announced during the course of the evening that he was forming a new political party and that it is his intention that the present Government's program is inadequate and he doubts their intention to sincerely enforce it.

It has also been announced that there will be no compromise with the old Conservative party and that he will have a candidate in every federal riding.

During the past year Mr. Stevens has gained considerable prominence with respect to his associations as Chairman of the Price Spreads Commission. His platform ability has also gained for him considerable public popularity. It was suggested at one time that he would assume the leadership of the Conservative party in place of Mr. Bennett, should his health make it necessary for him to surrender his duties, but Mr. Bennett's definite announcement, that he would lead the Conservative party, ended all possibility of that.

Clubs are to be the basis of the new Stevens' group and are to be organized throughout the Dominion. A statement issued by Mr. Stevens in a group of men interested only in the welfare of the Dominion and who are willing to give their time and the thought of political reformation. The party is being formed in the interests of the farmer, the smaller merchant, the manufacturer and unorganized clerical classes.

Undoubtedly the formation of the Stevens' party will open a way and for a great many people who find it impossible to find the leadership they want in the Conservative or the Liberal party.
