THIS WEEK ON PARLIAMENT HILL

Ottawa, July 23.—The Canadian political scene changed this week as the Dominion moved nearer a general election.

The Canadian voters, the object of all this activity, have for their consideration the platforms of the two left wing parties, the new Reconstruction Party and the C.C.F.

Government reaction to the preliminary skirmishes has been notably lacking. It is not expected that the keynote of the Conservative Party will be sound until the election date is known.

The civil servants received good news when an order-in-council was passed approving the restoration of statutory increases, partially retroactive. The order followed a \$1,000,000 appropriation passed in the supplementary estimates just before prorogation of parliament.

Violation of trade agreements by Japan brought definite action from the Cabinet. Japan imposed a 50 per cent surtax on ten leading Canadian exports.

The Hamilton plan to hit back by having Japanese exports under the existing trade agreements and placing them under the general tariff.

It is further anticipated that several of the more important Japanese products imported into Canada may be double surtaxed.

Mr. Stevens was issuing his manifesto favoring nationalization of the bank. Mr. Lyons, Prime Minister of Australia declared himself in direct opposition while speaking in Canada.

Speaking at Hamilton Mr. Stevens contradicted reports that there was a link between the N.R.P. and the Tory Party.
