It is not an unchanging body that consists of 600,000 men who are constantly unemployed, in fact, in the majority of cases the period of unemployment is comparatively short. According to the latest Ministry of Labor Returns the number of persons on the register who were applying for benefit or unemployment allowance totalled 1,922,623, and of this figure about 60 per cent had been out of work for less than three months, 69 per cent for less than six months, and 20 per cent for 12 months or more.—Indiana.

**LONDON-PARIS RECORD**  
First of two Concorde monoplane ordered by the French Government, the English-Australian speed races has broken all records for the London-Paris run.  
Piloted by Mr. Hugh Buckingham, one of the de Havilland test pilots, and carrying six passengers, the plane took to the air on Monday morning, Paris, 53 minutes after leaving the runway at the moment of its departure. It flew at an altitude of 22,500 feet, and its average speed was 170 miles an hour, which is 110 miles an hour more than the previous record. It took 23.3 minutes to travel the 250 miles of the London-Paris run.  
Time clocked in the air from take-off to landing at Le Bourget, 15 minutes and 47 seconds, giving an average speed of 170 miles an hour. The flight was a British record.
