**NEW LIGHTING SYSTEM NOW IN USE**

 ing, Mr. Chapman explained. "These are not necessarily straight tubes, they may be circular, V-shape or any style that the architect desires, to make the lighting harmonize with the general design of the home. Interior decorators have found them a means of expressing their ideas, for present wiring can be adapted to their use. In addition it is possible to use any color of light by means of colored glass tubes."

First, is the fact that the tubes can be made to harmonize with any style of decoration or architecture. Then, in the matter of lighting, they cast an even light to all parts of the room. Dark corners are eliminated and consumption of the lamps themselves is low. Life of the present lamps in common use today, Mr. Chapman explained, is approximately 1,000 burning hours. The new tube lamps, he said, will last from three to five thousand hours of continuous burning.

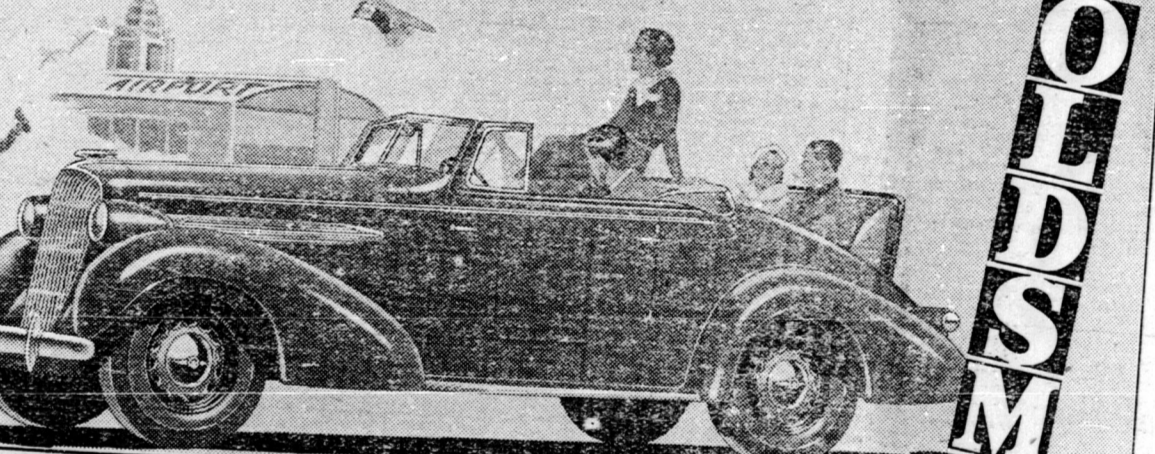
