**RECIPROCAL TRADE AGREEMENTS**

The Italo-Ethiopian Conflict has been given a sort of second rating regarding importance this week and the Canadian and American Public has been watching with great interest the announcement of the details of the Trade Treaty between Canada and the United States. It has been a problem between the two governments for some time and the arrival at a pact even though a part's still exist is thought a double step in the right direction between two countries side by side for the most part with an imaginary boundary. It was indeed unfortunate that barriers of such proportions were ever built up between these nations. Over production in the United States was responsible for shutting out the Canadian Agriculturist and even at the present time the farmers in the western portion of the United States predict ruin as a result of the duties on Canadian Agricultural Products. The Textile and Canning Industry in Canada can not find anything favorable in connection with the new regulations of duties. This however, is inevitable, as almost every tariff adjustment that has ever been made in Canada, by Liberal or Conservative Governments has been open to legitimate criticism. It is hoped however, that the increased trade that will naturally develop between the two countries will overcome the injury to those industries most seriously affected by the regulations.

**NOMINATION FRIDAY**

The 1935 Village Council held its final meeting in the Clerk's office on Friday evening to conclude final business before preparation of the Financial Statement for the year. On Friday evening the members will have an opportunity to look over the affairs of the Village as conducted by the Council during the past year and if they so desire to nominate any or all new members to conduct their business in 1936. Election day is set for December 2, (should there be any nominations), although the new Council will not take over the reins of office until the first of the year.

The Village has had able guidance under the leadership of Reeve Marshall in the past few years and it would appear that every effort will be made to prevail upon him to continue this office for another term. Jarvis is in line for the wardenship of the County and it would be impossible for the Village to send any more capable to the County seat to fill this responsible position. There is a little doubt held in this end of the County that Marshall's name will not be accorded the wardenship unanimously and although this position of honor is seldom accorded without opposition by other municipalities, it is expected that in view of the fact Jarvis is in turn for the office and with our Reeve's winning personality and popularity with his fellow councillors he will be given the position without opposition.

**BRAIN WEIGHTS**

Scientists have proved that big brains do not necessarily mean an outside intellect. The weight of the average man's brain is 49.5 ounces, and the average woman's 44 ounces. Nevertheless, that brilliant writer, Anatole France, possessed a brain of only 38 ounces. But anyone who possesses a brain of less than 30 ounces or more than 75 ounces would in all probability be an idiot. Professor Karl Pearson and Dr. Raymond Pearl conducted an interesting experiment with thousands of male and female adult brains which showed that English races have smaller brains than Swedish, Bavarian, Hessian, and Bohemian, that often, clever men possess brains identical with those in the skulls of apes. Actually every person has two brains, just as they have two ears, nostrils, eyes, hands, and feet; and if one is destroyed or diseased the other can function every bit as efficiently.
