that he expected an agreement would be reached shortly. The Prime Minister has conferred personally with Solomatsu Kato, Japanese Minister to Canada, and negotiations are being continued by cable with Japan. The great distance which makes personal conferences impossible delays negotiations but government members are confident that a mutually satisfactory understanding will be reached terminating the trade war.

**Trade Pact Gossip**

Signing of the U.S.-Canadian Trade Pact marked the culmination of a 69-year-old dream. An agreement was reached in 1854 which has been described as "frowned through on Champagne" but it was terminated by the United States in 1868. Partly, at least because of Great Britain's attitude concerning the Civil War. Since that time there has been a fruitless series of negotiations. In 1911 Sir Wilfred Laurier negotiated a pact but it was swept out of office before it could be made effective.

Negotiations for the present treaty were commenced almost a year ago by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett. Conservatives at Ottawa are naturally optimistic to this fact and claiming credit for the preliminary work. Too, there can be little doubt that Mr. Roosevelt was informed on the Canadian political situation and knew that changes of the Conservative government being returned were slim. It would be natural under those conditions to delay action.

The Liberals retort with the story of Premier King's dramatic success and declare that a Conservative government would not have been able to reach an agreement with the Southern neighbors.

In discussions among parliament servers attention is being drawn to the different positions of the Prime Minister and the President. Mr. King has just stepped into office and has the freedom which four years of power give him. President Roosevelt faces an election within a year and must of necessity move cautiously.

Agricultural interests as well as producers' organizations of the United States have been waging a strong battle to block concessions to Canada. The Florida agricultural tariff association has given consideration to court action questioning the right of congress to give power to the President.

**About Reform Measures**

The Provincial conference opening here December 9 will have without the benefit of a supreme court ruling on the validity of the reform measures passed by the Bennett government. For a time slight hope was held that a special court session might hand down a ruling before the Premier's conference but with the date for this set for January 15 the members will have to carry out their discussions without that information.

An important ruling by chief justice Sir Lyman Duff concerning the Canadian Tribunal of Inquiry is that only counsel for the provinces rather than the Dominion and the provinces rather than on the statutes.

Hon. N. W. Rowell, Toronto, and Louis St. Laurent, Quebec, will argue for the Dominion in support of the validity of the statutes.

The trade and industry commission which was formed by the defeat of government following the price spreads enquiry has received numerous requests from a number of industries to eliminate what they regard as unfair or unsatisfactory business conditions. As the commission was brought into being under the legislation which the supreme court is to probe no action is being taken until the question of legality is cleared.

There is a growing opinion here that John L. McFarland may remain "what heas chairman until the present wheat tangle is cleared. The number of men in Canada who can be regarded as authorities on wheat export is surprisingly small and the task of choosing a successor for Mr. McFarland would not be an easy one.
