CANADA ON THE UPGRADE

The Bank of Nova Scotia has issued a circular comparing business conditions in Canada and the United States. The United States indicates that the Canadian indices are based on data from the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Each series has been corrected for seasonal variation. The base is 10 in the monthly average of the period between 1925 and 1929. These figures show that conditions are on the upgrade in both countries, but that Canada is far in the lead towards restoration of conditions between 1925 and 1929. In July of this year the index for employment in Canada was 92.6, while in the United States only 79.9. A year ago the figures for Canada were 87.8, and in the Republic 75.9. In other words Canada's employment in manufacturing is 7.4 points of being normal as based on the employment of the boom years.

INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION IN CANADA

Industrial production in Canada is almost normal and has reached 96.2 compared with 88.4 in July of a year ago. The United States figures were 75.8 in July of this year and 69.4 in 1934. Revenue for carloadings are down slightly, but Canada's position is better than the United States. In July the figures were 67.1 in July 1935, as compared with 68 a year ago and the United States 55.6 in July 1934, compared with 58.9 in 1934.

NEW TYPES OF PAVEMENT

Leeds County is at the present time witnessing the introduction of a new type of highway surface, known as a mixture of calcium chloride, which is claimed will, in addition to other advantages, lead to a marked curtailment of maintenance costs, a consideration not to be ignored during this period of necessity for the exercise of the utmost economy in public expenditures. Roads of this type have been in successful use for some years in New York state and their practicability in Ontario will be equally well demonstrated.

FREEZING FISH IN ACID

Freezing fish in a film of boric acid solution is proving a boon to Canadian shippers of fishy foodstuffs. When frozen fish are shipped in an unexpected state they lose moisture rapidly and the flavor of the fish is impaired. For some time it has been the practice to seal the fish up in a film of ice in order to keep the natural moisture in the flesh. This layer of "glaze" is easily broken in handling, so the method has not been entirely satisfactory.

VOICE OF THE PRESS

Fisheries Experimental Station at Prince Rupert, B.C., have discovered that a tough "glaze" can be formed over the fish by freezing a solution of boric acid on them. This boric acid ice does not crack easily and a ship may be broken out of it without injuring the surrounding surface. Very little of the acid penetrates into the fish. The acid also serves to keep down the bacteria which cause rot in the fish. The method is proving satisfactory.

CRANKY STOVE PIPES

THE BROKERAGE

The experiment of selling all hogs on the rail which was started a few weeks ago by the Prime Minister, J. A.
