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THIS WEEK ON PARLIAMENT HILL

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—Canadian political scene this week watched William Aberhart tackle the task of organizing the Dominion's first Social Credit Government while they waited for Premier R. B. Bennett to speak on Friday, September 6. Mr. Bennett's talk will mark the government's first opening of the general election campaign and from the time he outlines the Conservative platform until the ballots are marked on October 14 the political stage will be crowded.

Encouraged by their overwhelming success in the provincial campaign the Social Credit party will contest the federal election and will probably have a candidate in each of the 17 ridings in Alberta. In Calgary West Premier Bennett will face one of Mr. Aberhart's federal candidates there.

Laymen across the Dominion are meantime showing a sudden interest in social credit. Outside of Alberta there is little general knowledge of the complex plan. Mr. Aberhart's promise of \$25 dividends to every adult in the province is the plan that has caught the general eye. The briefest explanation of the plan that is being adopted to make purchasing power catch up with productive capacity. The social credit provides compensation to those who would otherwise suffer from lowered prices.

In the theory of social credit production rather than money is the controlling factor. Provisions are made for the scheme, including expanding or contracting credit as conditions require.

Carefully pointing out that "social credit is not a new political party," he said that the party was not a political party, but a movement for the betterment of the people.

Washington — The Federal Farm Board's effort to peg the price of wheat and cotton has cost them nearly \$45 million dollars from a fund of \$60 million between 1929 and June 1935. Under the plan, the Board is to make purchases when the price of wheat falls below a certain level and to sell when it rises above that level.

London — Too bad for the chameleons. The sea along the coast of England is gradually receding, recent discoveries indicate that the sea level has fallen several feet since the last ice age.

Boston — "Better roads for the farmers and ourselves," was the cry of rural mail carriers at their annual convention here.

Washington — A Cinderella story, which many try weekly for an opportunity on Major Bowes' amateur hour on Sundays only an average of 15 are chosen. But those hopeful who do succeed are assured of a bright future says the general manager.
