MODEL COACHES

With living-rooms turned into work shops and attic or cellar nooks in houses large and small set up with carpenter benches, 15,000 Canadian boys are now busily engaged in the construction of miniature model Napoleonic coaches. In all centres of the Dominion, boys are prying over detailed plans, using minute tools, in expert craftsmanship and moulding into shape. They are members of the Fisher Body Craftsmen's Guild and are giving of their best in fine workmanship to earn some of the general funds of the Guild is offering to the youth of Canada and the United States this year in the \$75,000 coach building competition.

Enrollments in the Canadian Section of the Guild this year have exceeded all expectations, and indicate a keen interest among the younger generation in work that develops the skill and craftsmanship and induces ingenuity and perseverance. This enthusiasm among Canadians was predicted by R. S. McLaughlin, President of General Motors of Canada, and the president, also of the Canadian section of the Guild, when through his efforts, the competition was extended to Canada this year.

Mr. McLaughlin himself a master craftsman in the days of the old McLaughlin Carriage Company, is deeply interested in the very type of work the Guild is fostering, and the advantages the Guild offers in its type of training, fitting young men, as it does, to play a much-needed master craftsman's role in this industrial age, and to become better citizens.

The Guild members have until July to complete their miniature models. During that month, judging will take place, with separate contests in each of seven districts in Canada. The judging for the whole of the Dominion will be under the supervision of Brig.-Gen. C. H. Mitchell, Dean of the Faculty of Applied Science, University of Toronto, and M. Austin Frigon, Director of Technical Education for the Province of Quebec and Dean of Ecole Polytechnique, University of Montreal.

The boys who build the two best models in each of the Canadian districts will receive in addition to \$100 in cash, free trips to attend the Guild Convention in Detroit in August, where their coaches will be judged in the International competition for four-year University Scholarships, valued at \$5,000 each.
