Moving on down to Stratford, we found the old boys re-union in full blast celebrating the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of that town. It is quite striking to see with what speed they go through the water. Nelson won George second and Spender third. Pretty nearly everything in the sport line was going on. Moving on down we took in the fine town of Woodstock and Ingersoll, landed at Tillsonburg, where we had a light meal of two cent, worth of bread, one cent worth of potatoes, half a cent worth of butter, quarter cent worth of tea, one-cent worth of sugar and milk and all this for six cents. Feeling refreshed we set out for the gay old village we call home and felt at rest once more after five days travel among good roads, fine country and among fine people.
