DEATH CLAIMS JAMES WALKER

Old Citizen of Jarvis Has Passed On. Farmed in District For Many Years. James Walker, a highly respected resident of Jarvis for the past 20 years, died at his home, Lydia street on Thursday evening in his 72nd year. Born in Haldimand county, the son of John and Martha Walker, who came from England and settled in the county many years ago, the deceased had, prior to his residing in Jarvis, been a successful farmer in the district. Of a genial and kindly disposition, Mr. Walker enjoyed the esteem of a wide circle of friends and his passing will be deeply mourned. Although he had been in failing health for some time Mr. Walker was well enough to attend on Wednesday last the 24th annual reunion of the Walker family, of which he was one of the four original members, and his striking from an unexpected heart attack came as a severe shock. Survivors. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Margaret Walker, two sons, WILFRED Willis, of Jarvis and John Willis, of Hamilton, and two brothers and one sister, William Walker, of Nanticoke and Mrs. Annie Ellsworth, who lives in Boston, Mass. Following a brief private funeral service at his home on Saturday afternoon, the funeral cortege proceeded to St. Paul's Anglican church for public services. As a tribute to the worth and character of Mr. Walker was the large assembly of relatives and friends which filled the church, and the many handsome floral offerings sent in sympathy to his bereaved family.
