We must admit, for he can deny it, that in the play and the business side of a great holiday, there is much that is not the Christmas, with our Christmas family gatherings, and family Christmas toys and games and Christmas laughter, Christmas boxes and Christmas social life, all its various problems and follies, there is nothing at all akin to religion."

Christmas comes but once a year, and this year it comes in the midst of a life that is hard and sometimes bitter pain and sorrow, and in the midst of it all, does it not bring to the mind of true religious that sometimes think? In all the little nameless, unremembered acts of kindness and of love, there are characteristic of Christmas. There is not the making of life for many people and society at large. Wherein lies the secret significance of the whole season? It is not the festival which celebrates the act of identifying himself with man and becoming man that man might become Divine. This is the very essence of our Christian religion. No one can explain this central truth of Christianity, no arguments can move it to those who are unwilling to believe. There is a sense of keeping Christmas which does violence to the sacredness of the season. Unless Christmas is kept in the heart, it can be kept no where. It will simply be keeping in remembrance an old pagan holiday, an affair of meat and drink.

Christmas should be a happy event in the early days of its coming. It should be a time of joy and gladness, a time of giving and receiving. It should be a time of peace and goodwill, a time of love and fellowship. It should be a time of hope and faith, a time of courage and strength. It should be a time of unity and harmony, a time of peace and goodwill.
