The curious thing in connection with the event was the discovery that as soon as the explosion ceased, the crater, which always has been lit up at night by internal fires, was cold dark. Natural scientists began an investigation to determine why.

Compulsory Voting
Lima, Peru.—Compulsory voting for men between the ages of 21 and 60 was recently approved as part of the new Peruvian constitution in process of adoption by the constitutional congress.

Good Trade Balance Reported by Bulgaria
Sofia, Bulgaria.—The very "favorable" trade balance, during the November exports exceeded imports by more than 100 per cent. Merchandise worth 712,000,000 leva or about \$1,600,000 was sent out of the country and products worth 551,000,000 leva were shipped into it.

Latvia and Estonia Lift Export Duty on Timber
Riga, Latvia.—In order to assist the Latvian timber exporters, the Latvian Government has abolished the export duty on various kinds of goods, and especially on pulpwood.

New Mineral Identified
Stanford University, Calif.—Prof. A. F. Rogers of the chemistry department of Stanford University has identified a new mineral which he calls Sanbornite. He said it is a barium silicate never found before.
