EXTENSION OF SPECIAL FARE

Montreal, Feb. 18.—In response to public demand, low week-end round trip fares, which have been offered by the Canadian National, Canadian Pacific and other railway lines in the Dominion since last summer, will remain in force after February 29, the date originally set for their discontinuance.

In making this announcement, the Canadian Passenger Association draws attention to the privileges now in force and of which extension is now to be made. Round trip tickets between any Canadian Stations for any week-end are offered by the railways at the rate of one and a quarter times the regular single fare.

THE HIGH COST OF ELECTING.

It may be of interest to the public, who say for it all to know just what they paid for the privilege of electing 245 members to the Dominion House of Parliament in 1930. Well, it cost them \$500,000.00 and if you divide that by 245 elected members it gives \$2,040.81—that is the average cost to the public for electing each man. Then, having got them there, the taxpayers give each one of the members \$21,000.00 a session and free transportation back and forth to Ottawa. Some of these members who head the different departments get a lot more thousands added to the regular fee. The salaries of the 245 members including the Cabinet amount to about \$1,000,000.00 a session. The parliamentary session is pretty short and don't you think these men are pretty well paid. Of course, the members voted themselves generous pay to themselves—why not and they think it looks pretty large too, so they call up the excuse book and find that they give so much to Churches, Charity, and other kindly acts, and have so much hard work shaking hands at election time, that they don't feel badly about it. Have any of our churches, charitable institutions, hard up taxpayers, or any thing else, ever received anything to let, from our big paid representatives. It would be nice to hear of some donation.
