Interesting History of Our Municipality

The Talbot Road was chopped out in 1834, and was graded and ditched by a company of Negro troops in 1837-1840.

The road was constructed for military purposes, following the McKenzie rebellion of 1837, as a connecting link between Niagara Falls and St. Thomas, the headquarters of the military districts of Niagara and St. Thomas or Talbot District.

It was constructed under the direction of Colonel Thos. Talbot, hence the name Talbot road. He was a pioneer of the Talbot district in the county of Elgin.

The earliest settlers along the Talbot Highway included Samuel Montgomery, on Lot 10, Con. 7; and Stale Montgomery Lot 10 Con. 8; Hiram McDowell, Lot 14, Con. 7 or where Montgatiers Hotel used to be.

In the year 1837 the first religious service held in the township of Walpole was a christening at the home of Steele Montgomery, by the Rev. Dr. Ryans of St. Johns Church, Woodhouse.

The construction of the Plank road through Walpole was commenced in 1835, and completed in 1836. The contract for the construction of this road from Hagersville to Port Dover was held by A. Ronald McKinnon of Caledonia. The first settlers in that place and came to Caledonia in 1835, as a contractor of the Grand River Navigation Company.

The Caledonia bridge being built in 1842, prior to that time all traffic in that direction crossed the river at Indianan.

Mr. McKinnon was an unsuccessful candidate for parliamentary honors in 1851, William Lyon McKenzie and George Brown being the other candidates in this district. An ardent outdoorsman, he was largely instrumental in the order being established in the town beside the Grand River, and he became one of the Charter members of Cayuga Lodge, No. 286, and was at the time of his demise a Past Grand.
