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REFUSE TO HEAR UNITED DELEGATE

HEATED DISCUSSION BREAKS OUT AT PRESBYTERIAN MEETING AT LONDON

London, Ont., June 2—Rev. James Endicott, D.C., former moderator of the United Church, withdrew today from the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. A heated discussion, and wide differences of opinion as to whether the assembly should refuse to hear the United Church, borne by the former moderator.

Before a decision was reached, Dr. Endicott withdrew. An official protest from the United Church against the use of the term "Presbyterian Church in Canada" precipitated the schism. It also was asserted that the Presbyterian Church had no basis in fact and that its identity was merged in the United Church, through the union bill passed by parliament.

After a long and heated debate, the assembly finally decided to establish a special committee to study relations between the two churches and the legal claims of the United Church.

Greetings were heard from the Anglican Church, expressed through Dean N. L. Tucker, of London. It was understood an unofficial delegation expressed to Dr. Endicott regret at the incident.

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GRAND RIVER VALLEY ASSOCIATED BOARD OF TRADE

Good Attendance at Caledonia

The Grand River Valley Associated Board of Trade held their regular meeting in Caledonia on Monday afternoon.

They met at the Gypsum, Lime and Alabaster, Canada, Limited plant at Caledonia where they were received by Mr. L. V. Robinson and Mr. J. G. M. Thomson. They were shown through the mine and viewed the drilling and loading operations in the mine, followed by a tour of inspection through the Wall Board Plant—this was an entirely new experience to the majority of those present, as very few had been through a mine and plant of this kind before.

They then visited the Caledonia High School where they were received by Mr. C. N. Aldridge and Mr. A. G. Enxson, representing the Council. The meeting was held in the auditorium of the school, the president, Mr. Gordon Cockburn of Brantford, occupied the chair.

Due to illness of the secretary, Mr. Fred L. Grob, of Brantford, Mr. Adams of Brantford was appointed secretary for the meeting.

Reports of committees were received and the principle one being that given by Mr. Phillips, of Galt, Chairman of the Flood Prevention Committee. With the co-operation of the Government a survey has been made of the Grand River and a very complete report is being supplied to all municipalities in the area.

This report gives valuable information. A report was also given of the reforestation committee by the convener, Mr. Weaver, and in following this up it was decided to hold the next meeting at Port Dover and visit the Reforestation Farm at St. Williams.

At 7 o'clock a splendid banquet was held at the home of Mrs. Cockburn, the hostess. The guests were treated to a most delicious meal.

The business session had been opened only two minutes when the old smouldering fire over church union broke into flames. The business committee recommended that fraternal delegates from the Anglican, Baptist and United Churches be received.

Opposition

Jumping up in opposition Rev. T. W. Taylor of St. Andrew's-by-the-Sea, N.B., said he would not subscribe to the reception of delegates from the United Church.

Without disclosing its source, he said he had received a letter protesting against the use of the title, Presbyterian Church in Canada as being illegal. In view of this the Presbyterians should not receive fraternal delegates from the United Church.

Three or four delegates attempted to take the floor. Rev. James MacKay of London, Ont., suggested this spirit of ill-will between the United Church should end if ever there is to be peace between us there must be a palm held out by those who were wounded.

When Dr. MacKay referred to a "spirit of retaliation" Mr. Taylor rose to a point of order and the words were withdrawn.

The assembly then returned to the question of receiving greetings from the United Church. Three or four delegates attempted to gain the floor.
