HAVE YOU FORGOTTEN ANY OF YOUR MONEY?

With practically everybody in the whole of Canada wishing that he or she could lay hands on a little more money, the astonishing fact is revealed by Grant Dexter in Maclean's Magazine for March 15th that fifty thousand Canadians have money in the bank without, apparently, knowing anything about it.

How it happens that people can and do lose money is something that this article cannot pretend to explain.

It is not true to the extent of fifty thousand people and more than two million dollars, which is the sum total of lost money now in the possession of our chartered banks.

But how account for the fact that Sir Lomer Gougeon, who died two years ago, deposited \$760,78 in the Royal Bank at Quebec in 1912 and forgot to tell anyone about it?

How account for the fact that Major General Alexander McDougall deposited a much smaller, but a substantial sum of money in the Royal Bank at Toronto in 1922 and forgot about it? The money is still there.

Or take the strange case of Chief Justice Latchford, of Ontario, who once was a law partner of Hon. Charles Murphy, Latchford and Murphy wound up their business at Ottawa many years ago, but missed one deposit in an Ottawa bank. The latest bank reports show it to be still there.

There is Hon. E. B. Ryckman, our Minister of National Revenue. His job is to look after the Government's income, see that we pay our taxes. But Mr. Ryckman has over a hundred two little bank accounts of his own which have been lying unclaimed and untouched in the Royal Bank at Toronto for many a year.

Even governments are absent-minded about money matters, as witness an item of \$50 held for the federal department of Marine and Fisheries by the Yarramack, N. S. branch of the bank of Montreal.

Just piece together this story about Alexander W. Gracey, of Toronto district. Mr. Gracey cleaned up some money in 1916. He put \$2,163.60 in the Dominion Bank at Toronto; \$1,203.53 in the Bank of Commerce and \$8,914.74 in the bank of Nova Scotia. Mr. Gracey then disappeared. In two of these accounts no address is given, but the third gives an address in care of W. J. Gracey, R. R. No. 1, Weston, Ontario. More than \$12,000 is involved, and it should not be difficult to locate the owner or his heirs.

Although in thousands of cases the explanation can only be absent-mindedness, there are many other cases that must have back of them stories of pathos and tragedy.
