SWINE POLICIES IN EFFECT IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Bacon Hog Club

This policy was instituted in 1932 for the purpose of improving the commercial hogs in the Province, through the use of better sires. It aims to place swine improvement work on a community basis, hence clubs consisting of ten or more members, with at least twenty-five approved sows, may secure the loan of an approved boar. Two hundred and ninety-seven such clubs were in existence on the 31st of October 1931. Of this number ninety-eight were started during the year 1931. 100 and sixty-eight boars were purchased during the year for use in these new clubs and also for replacement in some of the old clubs. These clubs are distributed throughout thirty-four counties and three districts in the Province of Ontario. Beginning January 1932 will the organization of the clubs be simplified and being financed on a fifty-fifty basis, by the Dominion and Ontario Live Stock Branches.

Bacon Hog Clubs

In order to round out the usefulness of Bacon Hog Clubs, "Bacon Hog Fairs" are organized each year at various points in the province at which fairs breeding and market hogs are entered in competition. Lectures and demonstrations are given along improved swine industry, and as to the proper type of market hogs. The cost of this is borne equally between the Dominion and Ontario Live Stock Branches.

Bacon Litter Competition

Bacon Litter Competitions were organized by the Dominion and Ontario Live Stock Branches, for the object of establishing a standard of excellence for grade brood sows kept by farmers. This competition aims to give good prolific, proper conformation brood sows, prominence as breeders in their respective centres, in the hope that female progeny will be selected as foundation brood sows in 1930 there were 124 entries in the Bacon Litter Competition and in 1931 there were 208 entries. As well as encouraging the distribution of choice young sows as a result of this competition, the Ontario Live Stock Branch, in co-operation with the Dominion Live Stock Branch, have assisted in the placing of high type young brood sows among communities of farmers in the Province, and such communities are one of the favorite centres for the raising of high type boars, by the two Branches. For the Bacon Litter Competition, the province is divided into the necessary number of districts and in each district prizes are given for the litters when they go to market. Such prizes as Size of Litter, Rate of Maturity, Percentage of Selects, etc., are used as a basis of scoring.

Advanced Register XXXBoars \$20.00
Appraised XXXBoars \$15.00
Swine Carlot Competition \$10.00

To bring home to the drover and farmer the question of type, quality and finish in our market hogs, the Ontario Live Stock Branch, in co-operation with the Dominion stage ment, and Fair Association, will each year carlot competitions. At the Canadian National Exhibition a special carlot competition was held at which nine carlots of forty hogs each were on display in 1931. At the Royal Winter Fair the drovers unite in bringing in select groups of hogs which are placed in competition on lots, the choicest of these hogs form the "Elite Carlot of Forty."

VANCOUVER TO DAWSON BY THE "INSIDE PASSAGE"

Those who are planning an extended vacation during 1933 would be well advised to consider that interesting trip from Victoria, Vancouver or Prince Rupert in the province of British Columbia, Canada, to Dawson, Yukon, world-famed centre of the gold rush of 1906.

As motor roads or railroads do not connect Dawson with the "outside," the trip with the exception of a distance of 100 miles from Skagway, Alaska, to Whitehorse, Yukon, over the White Pass and Yukon Railway, is made entirely by boat.

A large part of the cruise includes the "Inside Passage" along the coast of British Columbia and the Alaskan Panhandle. Nearly all of the voyage is through waters which are exceptionally well sheltered by scenic islands and majestic mountain ranges removing almost altogether any possibility of sea-sickness and the monotony of open seas.

The Inside Passage winds up the west coast of British Columbia past Queen Charlotte sound, Milbank sound and Dixon entrance, where, against the horizon, may be seen the towering peaks of the Coast Range.

On reaching Skagway, the Flounder, a large passenger liner, will take the party through the narrow channels, past the towering peaks of the Coast Range, to the north, breath-taking views, an ever-changing panorama, totem poles, glaciers, a thousand fiords and bays; these are some of the delights to be found along this rugged, timbered coastline.
