VOICE OF THE PEOPLE

It costs more to kill a bicyclist with an auto in Windsor, Ont. than it does in Hamilton County. On October 9th, two men, B. A. Winborne and Walter R. Caveney, of Michigan, U.S.A., struck and killed Steven L. Liss, a citizen police and customs officer joined in the hunt for the motorist and caught them in their car lined up to cross Ambassador bridge. These men were charged with manslaughter and bail fixed at \$10,000 each.

In Hamilton, about that time, or a little earlier, a Mr. Albright, of Little Wisconsin, U.S.A., struck and killed a cyclist near Cayuga on highway No. 3 and never stopped a moment to see what he had done. Hurried away and went round by Hagersville and then back via Jarvis to get to No. 3 again. Here he was held up by our local police officer, who taking his life in his hands, for people from Chicago war is often shot if the chances of escape are cut off by a cop, and had till two officers drove Mr. Albright back to No. 3 and took Mr. A. back to Cayuga. In a few days Mr. Albright was let off on \$125.00 bail till October 4th. Was he expected to come back? He didn't, of course the law got the 30 days and Mr. Albright got his freedom. What did the wife and children of the dead man get?—nothing, public, but sorrow, anguish and the loss, forever, of the husband and father.

If that \$125.00 bail was not another piece of rotten hypocrisy, then its hard to say what to call it.

At \$125.00 a victim, No. 3 highway in Hamilton should soon become a favorite spot for cold blooded American and other speedsters to put more notches in their guns.
