JARVIS AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY HOLD 79th. ANNUAL FALL FAIR

The Jarvis Agricultural Society held the 79th annual Fall Fair on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week and as far as an exhibition goes it was pronounced a decided success. The exhibits in all departments far exceeded anything in many years. The total number of entries received was nearly 1000 in excess of last year, and fruit and vegetable, being the leaders. In apples alone over 75 bushels were shown, the principal exhibitors in this class were: John Erwin, of Waterford, George McEwen, of Lyndoch, J. J. Gilbertson, of Simcoe and Wesley Schuyler, of Jarvis, along with a number of local exhibitors.

The egg grading demonstration, put on by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, in charge of Mr. S. Barry, Assistant Chief of the Poultry Department, Ottawa, attracted much attention, and proved very educational to those who were opposed to the new regulations regarding the grading of eggs.

Much interest centered in the old three fiddler's contest, and brought out many contestants, who each in turn demonstrated to the many spectators, that the technical operation of a stringed instrument was learned many years ago, and that it is not a simple matter to play.

The Simcoe Boys Band under the leadership of that veteran leader, Ernest Knight, of Simcoe, proved that leadership can do in bringing to almost a state of perfection, in two years, what was considered raw material to start with. Time and again they received rounds of applause from the crowd. On arrival they led the school children's parade into the grounds and with their snow white uniforms ahead of the white and yellow of the school children, presented a very fine appearance indeed. They will be sure of an engagement at our next annual Fall Fair.

Mr. J. E. Ellis, of Byth, who placed the ribbons in the horse ring, knew that he had his hands full before completing his work, and stated that this must be a good horse, raising district.

Cat sheep and poultry classes were also well filled, and in quality was all that could be desired.
