THE ADVANTAGES OF A PLAN

A masterpiece is the fruition of an ideal. The just reward of effort to make perfect the small integral is to detail the thing perfection to which it is of primary importance to visualize the ultimate picture of a garden to obtain the effect desired.

Before planting you must first ascertain before you purchase your plants how high they grow, when they bloom, and color. Then plant the plants growing at the back, the middle and the front. It is much better to draw up a definite plan and proceed with it, rather than to attempt to complete all the garden without careful considerations of the above points. Much disappointment and considerable expense will be avoided.

SURPLUS TEACHERS SOON BE INCREASED BY GRADUATES

The old law of supply and demand is working with particular strength in the teaching profession. In times of prosperity, teaching was not as attractive as other professions and the number entering it kept at a low level.

But it is different now and in recent years the market has been glutted. Former teachers have returned to the profession from other countries, and the number of young men and women attracted by the fairly decent public school salaries and the generous secondary school remuneration has increased a tremendous surplus of teachers, forcing down salaries and making it difficult to secure a school.

There seems no indication of this surplus of teachers being diminished, rather that it will be greatly augmented when the Normal Schools graduate this year. The 1,700 minimum has been set aside, and may soon become almost a maximum.

A somewhat similar condition prevails in public school districts. With some 1,500 now unable to secure a position, and every likelihood of the number being greatly increased this year, salaries are going down, down, down. The old \$1,000 standard is out of reason—many are teaching for about half that amount.

And as long as boards can secure any number of teachers at almost any price, the outlook is not very bright for those who have chosen teaching as their life work.

THE OTTAWA SPOTLIGHT

Ottawa, April 22. We've had plenty of gloomy news all winter; here is a brighter budget for Easter:

Wholesale prices rose between February and March more than any month since August, 1929, when the depression began.

Higher prices were registered for wheat, hogs, steers, lambs, hides, butter, fresh and cured meats, barley, corn, flax, rye, peas, flour, bran and shorts! How's that for one month?

What prices are now fully 12 cents per bushel above the low mark reached four months ago.

On wheat, the price is now 12 cents above the low mark reached four months ago.

On the first two months of 1933 Canada exported 1,300,000 lbs. of fresh beef. In the corresponding months of 1932 she shipped only 547,000 lbs.

In the past twelve weeks Canada shipped 7,000 head of live cattle to the British market. Only 409 head were shipped in the same period a year ago.

Bank debts, which reflect activity of business, rose six per cent after seasonal adjustment.

Employment figures at the beginning of March, after seasonal adjustment, showed a rise. Improvement was registered in manufacturing, notably of textile, rubber, iron and steel products also in mining and construction.
